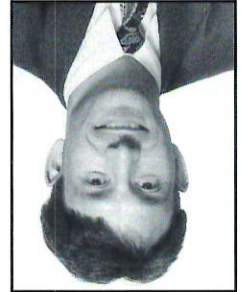

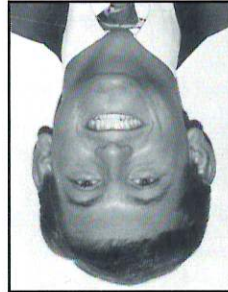

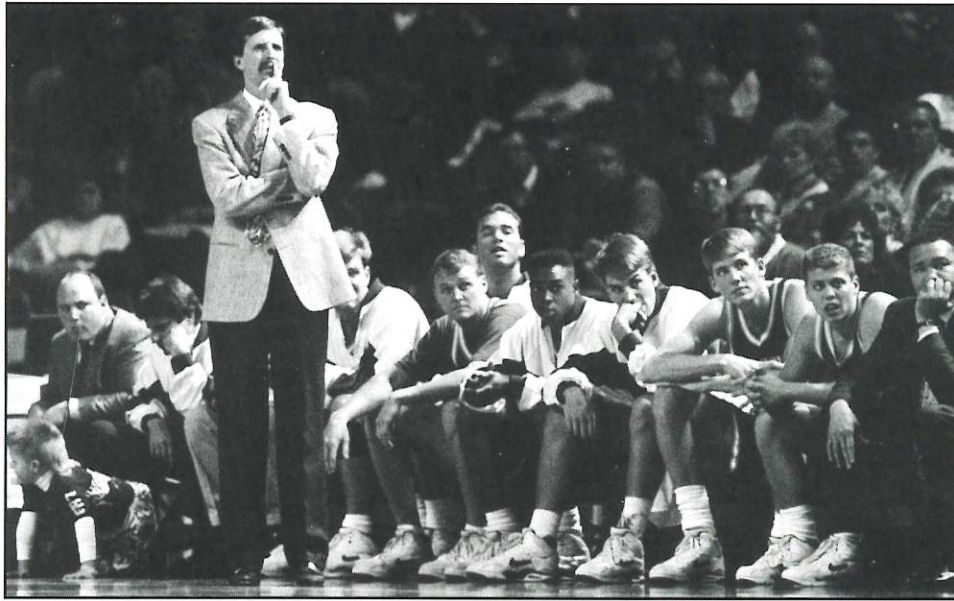

SEASON OUTLOOK '92-'93



"No Respect." That used to be the motto of the Spring Hill College basketball team. After being picked to finish sixth in the GCAC last year, the Badgers went on a relentless tear defeating seven nationally ranked teams on their way to an impressive 24-11 record, a first ever District 30 Championship, and a Final 16 finish at the NAIA National Tournament. With this outstanding list of accomplishments and four starters returning from last year's squad, one might think that the Spring Hill program has earned respect. Earned it they have. So much so that the Badger's are preseason ranked 13th in the nation and a clear favorite to repeat as District 30 Champions. So how does Badger head coach Carl Nash feel about this new "respect"?

"I'm happy that locally as well as nationally people recognize that Spring Hill has a quality basketball program. I am concerned, though, that now so much is being expected of us. We've always been in the role of the hunter and last year I really believe we snuck up on some people. Now we're on the other side of the coin. People will be gunning for us and wanting to take us down. That's a role we've never been in before, but I believe we will be able to rise to the challenge."

How Spring Hill will react to the role of favorite will depend largely on the five Badger seniors. All-District performer P. J. Thelen must continue to produce the same kind of numbers that he put up last year. The 6'8" off-guard gave opponents fits last year not only with his ability to score and rebound but also with his superior passing and ball handling skills along with an outstanding sense of anticipation on defense. Thelen is joined in the backcourt by GCAC assist champion and co-captain Sean Wright. A Mobile product, Wright provides the Badgers with stability and quickness at the point. Also on the perimeter is sharp-shooting Doug Layman whose shooting prowess is surpassed only by his relentless defense.

When talking about Spring Hill's defense, Brad Copenhaver must be mentioned. The steady power-forward provided the team with solid minutes off the bench last year and will assume a similar role this year. The fifth senior, Derek Wright, will be wearing a Badger uniform for the first time. This Division I transfer provides size, strength, and a fine shooting touch to an already impressive class.

"Our seniors will be our greatest source of strength this year," Nash states. "These are the guys who have grown with the program. They have brought the program to where it is today, and I know they will do all they can to keep it there."

While the Badgers have a strong group of seniors, their strength does not end there. This season Spring Hill returns Ronald Gomez and Marc Allen, two outstanding juniors. Gomez garnered All-District honors while

muscling his way to a team leading 16.3 points per game last year. Marc Allen, a 6'9" Mobilian who converted on two thirds of his field goal attempts last year, joins Gomez in the post providing the Badgers with a powerful inside attack. Adding depth to the post are Sam Coates, Chris Graefe, and Kevin Andrews. Coates, who saw significant playing time last year, contributes long range shooting as well as intelligent play in the trenches. Graefe and Andrews, meanwhile, continue to progress as solid post performers. Rounding out the junior class is guard Mark Hubbard, a JUCO transfer who will add a dead eye shooting touch to the backcourt.

Although Spring Hill is a team loaded with upperclassmen, there are some underclassmen who must play a great role if the Badgers plan to repeat their success of a year ago. Bobby Parker returns after showing flashes of brilliance in the backcourt last year as a freshman. The local product from Theodore is clearly the best athlete on the team and will push for a starting position on the perimeter. Another outstanding athlete is sophomore Demetris Tyson, a transfer from Lander College who will swing inside and outside this year. Freshman Steve Sterling, meanwhile, must step in and provide solid time at the point guard position. Closing out the Badgers roster is 6'7" red-shirt freshman Blake Stein. Blake was a starting pitcher last year for the Badger baseball team which also won the District 30 title and advanced in the national tournament.

If the Spring Hill basketball team is to make another trip to the NAIA National Tournament, they must survive a schedule nearly as brutal as last year's. The Badgers will again visit the University of New Orleans and have added another Division I opponent, Nicholls State. District 27 powers Montevallo, who was ranked in the Top 25 much of last year, and Auburn-Montgomery reappear on the '92-'93 schedule. Coach Nash believes that one reason the Badgers finished so strong last year was the toughness of the non-conference schedule.

"Playing a difficult non-conference schedule made us a tougher team last year. There is no question about it. After playing U.N.O. and all those ranked teams last year out of the conference, we were prepared for the competitiveness of our league. If we can compete with and beat those ranked teams, we will then have confidence going against the likes of Xavier, William Carey, or Mobile College. That's why I have put together another difficult schedule this year."

A tough schedule, the role of the favorite, and the generally difficult task of repeating all provide obstacles for a Spring Hill return trip to Kansas City and the national tournament. With these hurdles, however, has come the respect that this Badger program has always wanted. Now that the respect has been earned, Spring Hill will certainly do all it can to keep it.

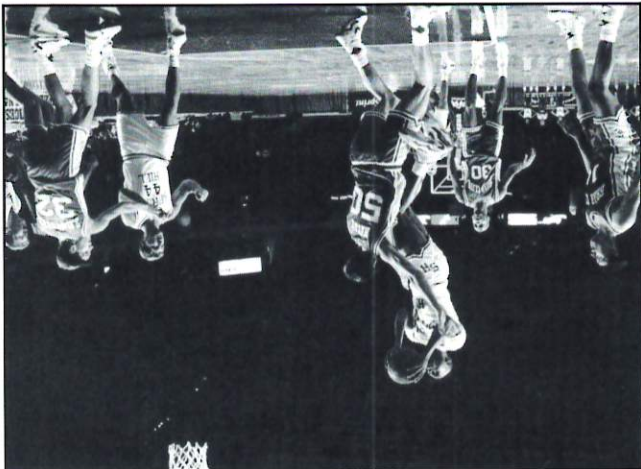

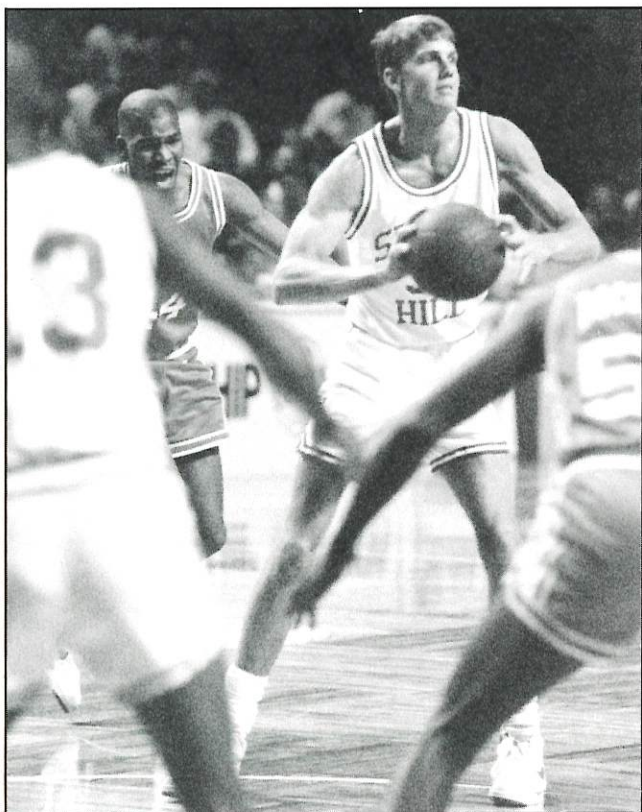

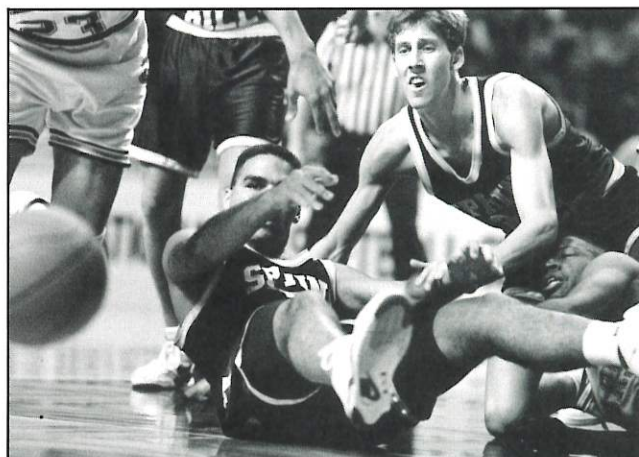

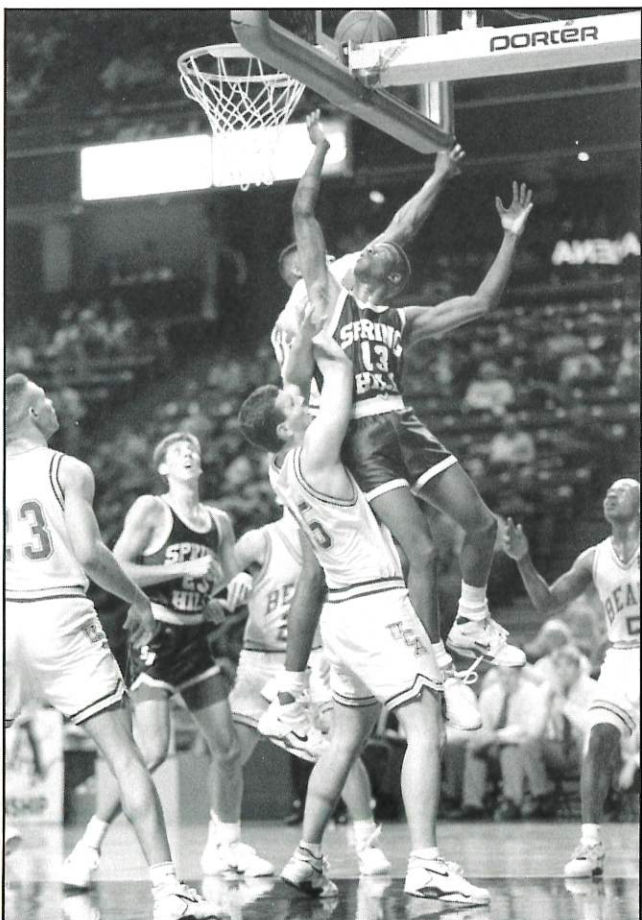

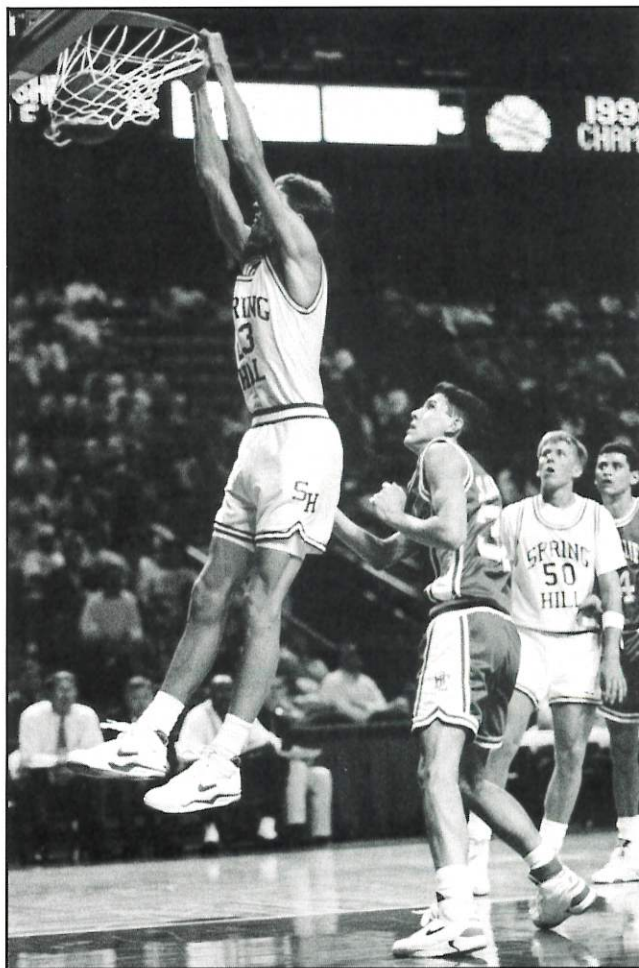
Marc Allen looks to make the assist

THE COACHES

Not only was Coach Nash voted District 30 "Coach of the Year", but he also placed himself as the coach with the best winning percentage in Spring Hill College history. All this in only 5½ years. What does Carl Nash take most pride in? It's easy to tell when you see how much emotion he has for his team. "We won the 1992 District 30 Championship and made the Sweet Sixteen at the NAIA National Tournament, we did it as a team. The team is what it's all about," states Coach Nash.

How did this realm of Coach Nash start? In January of 1989, Coach Carl Nash went from assistant coach to head coach and directed the Badgers to their third consecutive District 30 playoff appearance. At the age of 29 he became Spring Hill's 9th head basketball coach in 4½ years.

In 1990, his first full year as head coach, Nash directed Spring Hill into the District 30 semi-finals - only the second time the Badgers had ever reached that far in the District 30 Tournament. Three players off that team made the NAIA All-American Scholar-Athlete team. 1990-91 proved to be an up and down year. Once again the Badgers won 17 games and in three straight weeks Spring Hill received honorable mention votes for the NAIA Top twenty-five. Once again, Coach Nash was most proud of one of his players making the NAIA All-American Scholar-Athlete team and yet another making the NAIA Honorable Mention All-American team.

In 1991-92 Nash directed the Badgers to a record setting season. The first ever District 30 Championship and a birth in the Sweet Sixteen at the NAIA National Tournament. With 24 wins, a District Title, and another member of the team making the NAIA All-American Scholar-Athlete team, Carl Nash has placed himself at the top of the coaching ranks at Spring Hill College.

Coach Nash was born in Del Norte, Colorado where he was a standout in basketball and baseball. He attended Colorado State University and Fort Lewis College, where he graduated in 1982. Nash earned his M.S. in 1984 from the United States Sports Academy.

Nash began his coaching career at Durango High School in Durango, Colorado. He came to Spring Hill College in 1984 as a graduate assistant. In 1985 Nash left for the United Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, where he coached in the International Basketball program. His team won the "Ramadan Games" and he was voted "Coach of the Year" with a 27-7 record. Nash rejoined the Badgers in 1986 as an assistant coach and each season Spring Hill reached the District 30 playoffs. He has an 108-57 lifetime coaching record which translates to a .655 winning percentage.

Coach Nash is married to the former Pamela Meier of Raleigh, North Carolina.

RICK PIETRI, Assistant Coach

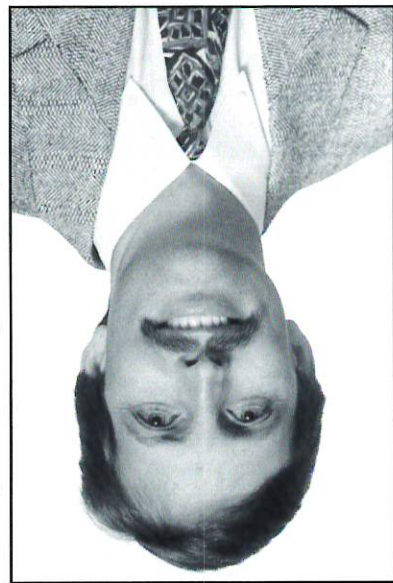
By assisting the Badgers to a 58-38 record over the past three seasons, Rick Pietri has earned the respect of many of his peers. Now entering his fourth year with the Badgers, Pietri brings with him the experience and stability necessary to keep the Spring Hill program rolling. Pietri is a native of New Orleans, Louisiana, and a 1983 graduate of De La Salle High School. He then arrived in Mobile on a full scholarship to manage the University of South Alabama basketball team. From U.S.A., Rick received his B.A. and M.Ed. degrees.

Prior to coming to Spring Hill, Rick was an assistant coach at St. Paul's High School in Covington, Louisiana, helping the Wolves to the District Title in 1988.

Rick is married to the former Suzanne Odom of Mobile.

TODD GARNER, Assistant Coach

Coach Garner is entering his first year as an assistant to Carl Nash. Garner 29, earned his bachelors degree at Indiana University and is presently pursuing his master's degree at the United States Sports Academy. He coached for one year at Knighthstown HS in Indiana. Then he coached at Saint Mary's College of Minnesota, where he was the assistant for two years. He has worked at more than 25 basketball camps across the country: Bob Knight, John Wooden, and Magic Johnson's, just to name a few.

23 P. J. THELEN, Co-Capt. 6-8 210 lbs. Senior Guard Lakeside Park, KY

As one of the most prolific players on the Badgers squad last season, Thelen consistently posted impressive numbers at the guard spot. He was the team's leading rebounder, garnering an average of 8.2 per game, and was second in scoring. He also led the conference in steals with 96 for the year, and was second in assists with 155.

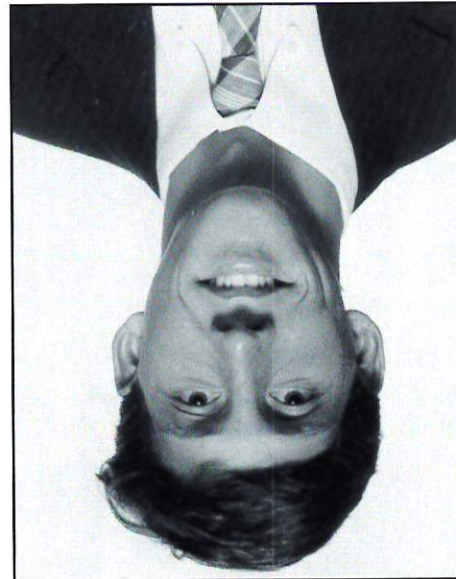
One of his most notable games was in post season play against Central Arkansas, when he posted a triple double. His best performance came against Xavier University when he netted 25 points and grabbed 12 rebounds.

As the league's tallest guard, Thelen should frustrate opponents even more this season after lifting weights and adding 20 pounds to his 6-8 frame.

Thelen nabbed first team All-Conference and first team All-District honors last year. He is also a member of the GCAC Honor Roll.

13 SEAN WRIGHT, Co-Capt. 6-1 166 lbs. Senior Guard Mobile, AL

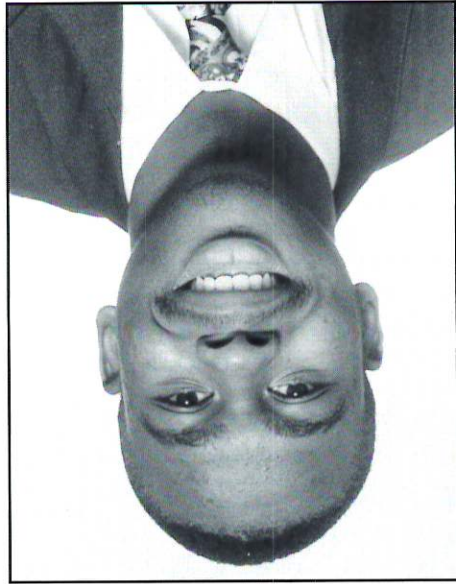

As one of the teams most intelligent players, Copenhaver could contribute at the power forward and post positions this year.

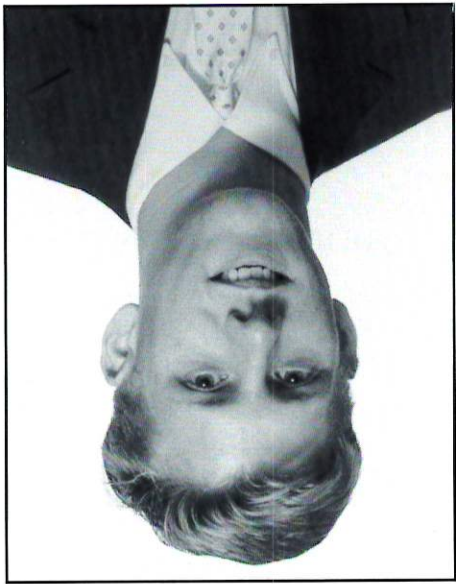
Copenhaver averaged 4.1 points per game last season. His best performance was 11 points vs. William Carey.

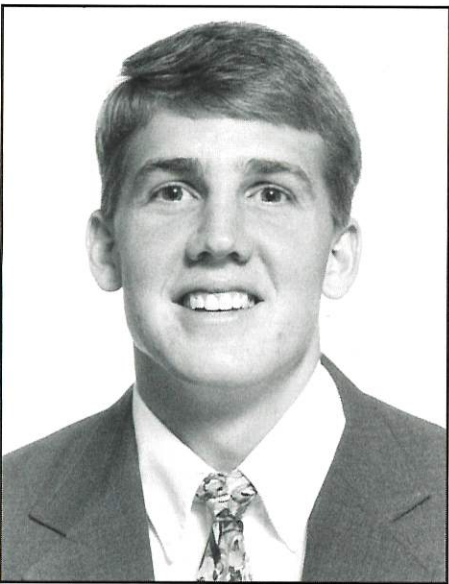
Layman started 25 games for the Badgers last season, averaging 8 points and 2.2 rebounds each outing. He is the teams best shooter, and has an excellent range.
