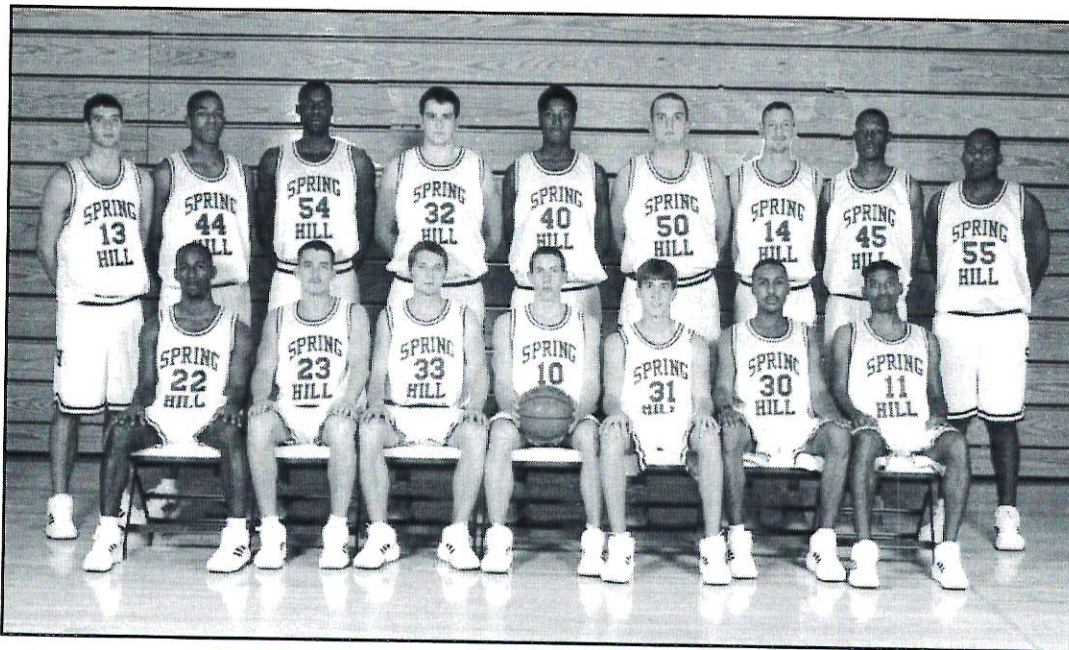

# TEAM PREVIEW

This year Spring Hill Basketball takes its final turn of the century and looks to the future under new Head Coach Bill Carr. The final decade has been kind to the Badger program, having produced 20 or more wins in seven of the last eight years and four NAIA National Tournament berths. Now, with Carr in the driver's seat, expect the dominance to continue well into the next millennium.

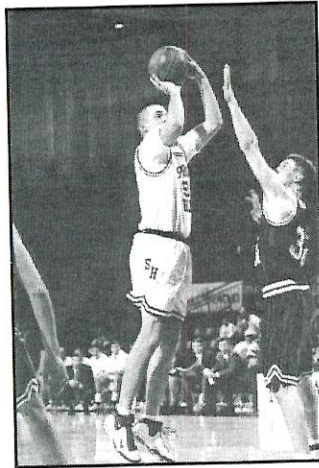
"I am really excited about coaching here at SHC," said Carr. "The school has so much to offer. From what I have seen in pre-season conditioning and the first few weeks of practice, fans will really enjoy what we bring to the table this season."

Carr brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to "The Hill" from the University of San Francisco, where he was an assistant coach for the previous nine seasons. As the lead assistant in 1997-98, the Dons made it to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1982. A proven recruiter, Carr helped deliver 10 first team all-West Coast Conference players to the City by the Bay. He also saw his players graduate, as over 90% received their degrees.

Now in the City of Mobile, Carr expects no less than a conference title and a national tournament berth.

## RETURNING PLAYERS

This season four scholarship players return to a squad that went 25-8 and advanced to the NAIA Tournament last year. The team's top returnee is 6-8 junior forward Nicky Saacks (11.3 ppg, 4.8 rpg). Last year Saacks was third on the team in scoring behind all-American Eric Campbell (22.8 ppg, 10.2 rpg)

and all-Gulf Coast Athletic Conference Wali Harrison (17.8 ppg, 4.8 rpg). Saacks will anchor the middle of the lineup and serve as the team's soft spoken leader and captain. Saacks also has the ability to spread out the defense with his mid to long range jumpers.

Wing Tony Younger was named GCAC Freshman of the Year after averaging 9.5 ppg and 4.5 rpg. Younger is an athletic 6-6, who will provide matchup problems at the point and will be the team's go-to player.

With the low post presence of Saacks, and the quick first step of Younger, 6-3 junior Shane Cline (3.3 ppg, 1.8 rpg) provides the team with a deadly outside shot. In his first year at SHC after transferring from Clermont College, Cline averaged 3.3 ppg, but shot 40% from three.

Shawn McKee, at 6-4, gained valuable experience from his year as a redshirt last season. McKee will play a valuable role on the team, as he gives Carr another option on both the offensive and defensive ends.

Walk-on guards Greg Rattigan, who returns to the program as a sophomore, and junior Lamar Hinton, who was out last year with a knee injury, will battle for playing time in the backcourt.

## NEWCOMERS

Carr is not the only new face to the Badger program, as eight players call Spring Hill College home for the first time.

Carr used his first month in the Port City to sign junior college transfer Oren Gritzman. The division-II transfer from New Jersey Institute of Technology stands at 6-7, and gives SHC a lethal weapon from long range.

Those expected to make an immediate impact are Spring Hill's eight freshmen. The biggest surprise in the pre-season came from 5-10 point guard Isaac Levy (Pensacola, FL). Levy, who is expected to vie for time at floor general, is extremely quick with the ball and very good defensively.

Louis Wright (Lacombe, LA) continues to work hard and is adjusting not only to the college game, but to a new position on the perimeter. Wright, who is Fontainebleu High School's all-

time leading scorer, played up front for most of his career.

With Saacks at 6-8 and Sadat at 6-9, two more twin towers will be ready to explode off the bench in 6-7 Reggie Warren (Cantonment, FL) and 6-8 Matt Mandrella (Spanish Fort, AL). Warren has good hands for a post player and will provide a spark from both ends of the floor. Day in and day out, Mandrella continues to develop his inside game, and is one of the team's hardest workers.

Mobile's own Eric Olen (McGill-Tollen HS) at 6-5 gives the Badgers versatility on the wing, not only on the offensive but defensive ends of the floor.

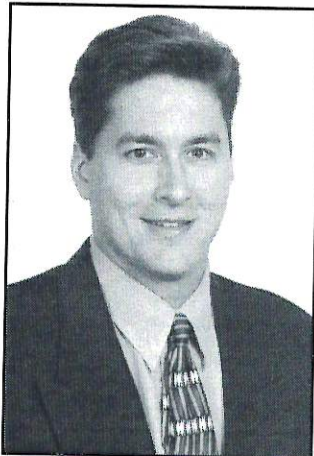
Guards Pete Arner (Mobile, AL) and Jeremy Speeg (Baton Rouge, LA) are also expected to provide time in the backcourt.

"From the first day of conditioning, there were a lot of unknowns surrounding this ballclub... new coach, new system, that kind of thing," said Carr recently. "But if they continue to play as hard as they have been, we should be in for an exciting season."



# SPRING HILL COACHES

## Bill Carr, Head Coach – 1st Season



Carr moves from one Hilltop to another, a mere 2400 miles apart, when he begins his first year as coach of Spring Hill College. Carr is the 11th coach in Badger history and takes over a program which has won 20 or more games in seven of the last eight seasons. The Badgers have reached the NAIA National Tournament four times in the 1990's.

Before SHC, Carr spent nine years as an assistant coach at the University of San Francisco, itself rich in basketball tradition, producing such NBA greats as Bill Russell, K.C. Jones and Bill Cartwright.

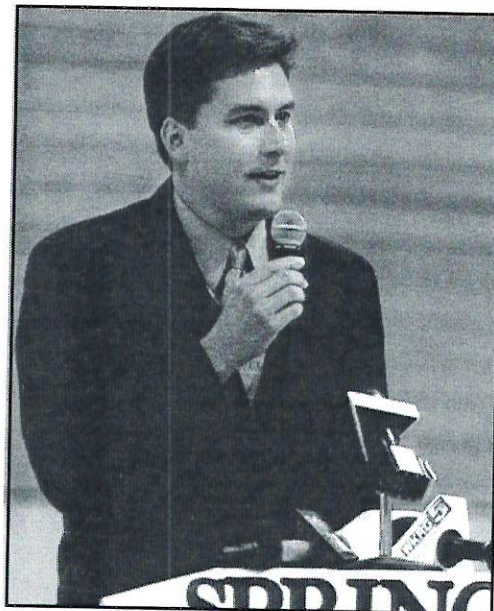
A proven recruiter, Carr helped deliver 10 first team all-West Coast Conference players to the City by the Bay. Those nationally touted recruiting classes also showed what they could do in the classroom, as more than 90-percent of them graduated.

As the lead assistant in 1998, Carr helped lead the Dons back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1982. Though USF would lose to eventual national finalist Utah in the first round, Carr had seen and been a large component in making the program move full circle.

Carr played on the coveted 1985-86 "Back to Basketball" squad at USF, led by former NBA coach Jim Brovelli, which returned basketball to the Hilltop after a three year hiatus. He played two years for the Hilltoppers from 1985-87. He came to USF after transferring from Glendale Junior College (Los Angeles), where he was an all-conference player.

After receiving his B.S. in accounting, he left to go to a Big Eight firm in San Francisco in 1988. It took two years for Carr to realize his true love was coaching basketball. In 1990, he returned to his alma mater where he spent the next nine seasons.

Carr, 34, and his wife Pam, are proud parents of three children: daughters, Allie (7) and Madison (3) and son, Paul (1).

## Tom Kenna, Assistant Coach – 1st Season

Kenna begins his first season at Spring Hill College after serving as an assistant coach at his alma mater St. Thomas University (Florida) last year. Kenna, 24, will be responsible for recruiting, player and team development as well as scouting upcoming opponents.

As a player, Kenna's quiet leadership, determined attitude, hard work and dedication propelled him to the forefront. As a senior at St. Thomas, Kenna shot 43 percent from beyond the arc and helped lead his team to the Florida Sun Conference Championship and a berth in the NAIA National Tournament. As a prep star in Hollywood, FL, Kenna averaged 13 points and eight rebounds as a senior in 1992-93. Kenna began his basketball tutelage by serving as a team manager for Leonard Hamilton's University of Miami squad in college. Kenna is single and resides in Mobile.



## Niall T. Adler, Director of Basketball Operations and Sports Information – 1st Season

Adler reunites with Carr for his first year of Badger Athletics, after a one year stint as the Assistant Sports Information Director at the University of Portland (Oregon). Adler's primary responsibilities will include team travel, academics and camp for the basketball program, as well as sports information and website development for the athletics department. Adler is also a member of CoSIDA.

Adler, a 1998 graduate of the University of San Francisco with a degree in mass media and minor in politics, served four years as the team's administrative assistant in charge of film exchange. The native of Albany, CA, also headed the campus radio and newspaper's sports departments, and produced a bi-monthly cable television program. As SportsWeek editor, *The Foghorn* was awarded its first national award in 30 years, and as Zeta Beta Tau chapter president, Adler was named to the *College of Honors* for dedication to one's school and fraternity. Adler has also worked for *One on One National Sports Radio* in Chicago and *KFRC-Radio* in San Francisco. Adler is single and resides in Mobile.

# Focus on Respect



The Citizenship Through Sports Alliance (CTSA) was formed because of each member organization's concern regarding the current sports culture. The alliance is an organization of 10 members representing: Major League Baseball (MLB), National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), National Basketball Association (NBA), National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS), National Football League (NFL), National Hockey League (NHL), National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), United States Olympic Committee (USOC) and the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA).

The breakdown of sportsmanship appears to mirror what is transpiring in society at large. The lack of respect for self, authority and others is significant. The lack of respect in sports and society parallel each other. For every example showcasing a lack of respect in sports, there are parallel examples found in society. Sports reflects society.

The CTSA mission is to promote the values of citizenship that are realized through sportsmanship and ethical play in athletics competition. Further, this initiative seeks to generate a sports culture that supports those values necessary to teach and learn respect for self and respect for others.

The target audiences for the alliance are athletes, their families, coaches, officials, fans, institutional administrators, corporate sponsors, the media and the public at large. Citizenship has been chosen as the focal point because it is the mission of the combined sports family to teach participants essential skills that will help young people become

better citizens. Sports is a conduit through which Americans feel a part of a community and thus can be an effective vehicle for promoting citizenship. The 10 alliance members believe that they have specific programs to help young people become better citizens.

CTSA has identified six principles that it will focus on over the next three years which relate to the sports culture. These principles are the promotion of: academic and social achievement; the value of diversity; drug-free athletes; the value of sport; ethical conduct; and nonviolence.

The expected outcomes of the CTSA initiative are: focus on ethical behavior in the communities that encourages and supports participation in sport as a positive character-building activity, a network of national sports organizations working together with the professional sports leagues to emphasize the values of respect for self, respect for others, teamwork, discipline, responsibility and commitment; a set of messages to be delivered on the subject of respect for self, others and the game itself; a sports culture that supports the values of integrity, honesty, fairness, inclusion, tolerance, pride and a commitment to excellence in all that we do.

Sports conduct will continue to deteriorate unless there is a collective, systematic approach to address the situation. The alliance believes it is critical to turn its attention to the positive examples of sportsmanship, the millions of athletes, coaches, fans and administrators who conduct themselves appropriately 99% of the time. The members of the alliance will continue to work diligently to eradicate inappropriate sports behavior.

# SPRING HILL ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT

## MARK PRIEDE, Athletics Director



A former Spring Hill golf coach, Mark Priede, begins his second year as Athletics Director. Priede has the responsibility of seeing that the role of athletics at Spring Hill complements the academic mission of the college. He also supervises the operation of the new recreation center.

Familiar with the history of the College's athletic program, Priede has established a plan for moving forward. "I have three main goals for athletics: to generate more alumni involvement, especially in the Booster Club; get students excited about Spring Hill athletics, creating greater game attendance; and developing those student-athletes into leaders.

Priede's success as a golf coach at Spring Hill and the University of San Francisco brought him national recognition. While at Spring Hill from 1993-95, Priede's women's golf team finished third in the country in 1994 and fifth in the nation in 1995. He was named Gulf Coast Athletic Conference Golf Coach of the Year in 1995. Priede's success continued when he moved to the University of San Francisco in 1996 as head women's golf coach and coordinator of athletic marketing. He garnered West Coast Conference Golf Coach of the Year honors in 1997. That same year his team won the West Coast Conference for the first time in USF history. Priede returned to Spring Hill in January 1998.

## LEE MACKIN, Athletic Trainer, MS ATC/L



Originally from Montgomery, AL, Mackin begins his first year as the athletic trainer for Spring Hill College. Mackin has a Bachelor's of Science in Biology and minor in Chemistry from the University of South Alabama (92); and Master's of Science in Sports Medicine from the U.S. Sports Academy (94).

As an athletic trainer, Mackin has worked with high school and college athletes, including: area high schools in Alabama and Mississippi; Auburn University lacrosse, rugby, rodeo/equestrian, wrestling and triathlon club teams; Tupelo Tornado Professional Baseball; Huntington College (Montgomery) and olympic development teams and camps. Mackin is also the co-founder and co-director of the Kenny Howard Athletic Training Fellowship, a joint venture between Auburn University and Auburn's Hughston Clinic.

## MARK WELLS, Assistant Athletic Trainer, MS ATC/L

Wells received his Bachelor's of Science and Master's of Science from West Florida in 1997 and 1998, respectively. Wells has worked at West Florida Hospital taking care of Tate High School athletes, while also being a physician assistant at the graduate school at the University of South Alabama. 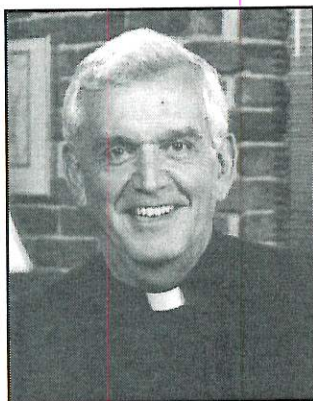

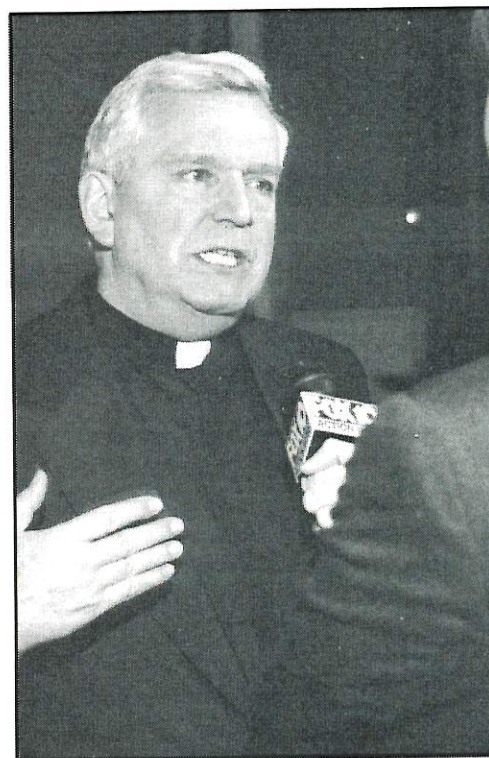


**Rev. Gregory Lucey, S.J.**

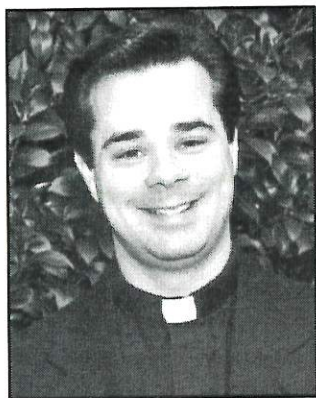

# THIS IS SPRING HILL COLLEGE

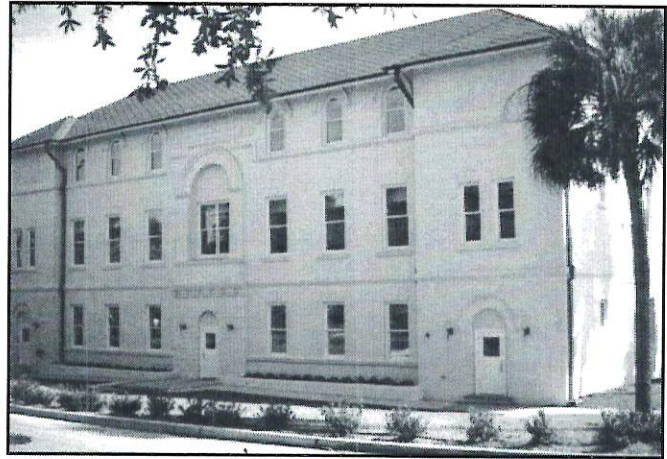


The Spring Hill College community invites you to discover a special place called "The Hill." A Jesuit, Catholic liberal arts college founded in 1830, Spring Hill is a close knit community where faculty prepare students for life— not just a career.

Because of the small classes, averaging 17 undergraduates per class, the students form close bonds... partnerships with each other as well as with Spring Hill's faculty and staff. The Spring Hill community takes the time and makes the effort to form caring, enduring relationships.

This concern for the individual person, what the Jesuits traditionally have called *cura personalis*, is a fundamental characteristic of the college community. This personalized care allows each student to develop individually while sharing in the ideals of the Spring Hill community.

Enrollment is 1400 students, 55% women, 18% minority and 70% from out of state. The campus is located in the heart of Mobile on 500-acres of greenery, including an 18-hole golf course. There are two 15-week semesters (Fall and Spring); two 2-week sessions following the Spring; and one 6-week summer session.

Rooted in Southern tradition, the people of Mobile are committed to the ethics and values that make America great. Through grassroots community projects, Mobilians are active in making the Port City a better place to live, visit and enjoy. This spirit of cooperation and commitment toward the future placed Mobile in a top-see position for the title of "All America City." That title, now won, can be seen by visitors not only on the city's street-side banners, but in the smiles of the friendly people of Mobile.

Mobile has always prospered because of its strategic location. A deep bay and harbor area offer a perfect shipping port. The barrier islands of Gulf Shores and Dauphin Island were ideal for military strategists. Strong forts assured that only welcome guests ventured into the bay. Today these many historic forts offer visitors a glimpse into the past.

The international trade sustained by Mobile throughout her 300-year history has provided even the earliest settlers with the finer things from Europe, England, the Mediterranean and the Orient. Mobile's five historic house-museums are open to the public year-round, display artifacts native to this land and treasures brought from far away.

Grand houses and public buildings, each with their own distinctive charm, reflect the builders' and owners' tastes and heritage. Festivals and observance of religious holidays were not forgotten by early settlers. From its founding in 1702, Mobile has celebrated Christmas, "Boef Gras" (now called Mardi Gras), Lent, Easter and more. Modern-day festivals now include the Azalea Trail Run and Festival (March), Providence Festival of Flowers (March), Bay Fest (October), Kwanza (December) and First Night Mobile (December).

The City also offers Spring Hill College, University of Mobile and South Alabama Athletic events; Mobile Admiral football games; Bay Bears minor league baseball; and Mysticks' minor league hockey games. Other events include music concerts at the Civic Center and numerous shows and conventions located at the waterfront's Convention Center.

Mobile is Alabama's second largest city at just over 500,000 people and is the state's only seaport. It is situated at the Southern end of I-65 and on the East-West route of I-10.

Mobile is in the Southern part of Alabama, about an hour from Biloxi, MS, two-and-a-half hours from New Orleans, four hours from Birmingham, AL and five hours from Atlanta.

It is no wonder that words such as "southern hospitality," "charm," and "beauty," are frequently used to describe this 300-year-old Port City.

Throughout its history, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) has provided strong leadership for all aspects of intercollegiate sports. Since its introduction of intercollegiate championship basketball in 1937, the NAIA has maintained the highest standards, while administering first-rate athletic programs.

Time and again, the NAIA has stepped forward to address the important issues of the day— be it racial integration in the 1940's and 1950's or the establishment of the first women's championship program in 1980. The NAIA has not been afraid to enact changes while others have watched and waited.

In the past decade, presidents of the NAIA colleges and universities have assumed a position of responsible leadership. The NAIA's Council of Presidents, the organization's primary governing body, is comprised of 32 colleges and university presidents from all regions of the United States.

With its major emphasis on educational development, it was natural for the NAIA to further strengthen academic eligibility requirements in the mid-80's. All NAIA student-athletes must maintain a certain grade point

average (GPA) while accumulating credit hours for a declared academic degree.

Unlike other associations, NAIA student-athlete academic eligibility is monitored on a term-by-term basis. The all-America Scholar Athlete program, a long-standing NAIA tradition, recognizes junior and senior student-athletes with a minimum GPA of 3.5 (on a 4.0 scale). This past year, more than 700 NAIA student-athletes were so honored, representing 225 member institutions.

During the 1990's, the waves of change once again washed over the NAIA. The membership voted to institute affiliated conference and regional groupings and discontinue the use of district play as a means of qualifying for National Championships; making the first time since the NAIA's creation that district competition would not be used.

Since 1937, the NAIA has administered athletic programs and championships in proper balance with the overall collegiate educational experience. Serving higher education in this manner is a responsibility the NAIA does not take lightly. It is a relationship built on confidence and trust— a relationship strengthened year after year. The future of 60,000 young people is too important to handle any other way.

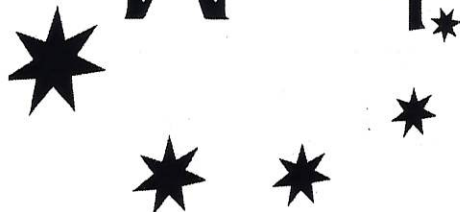

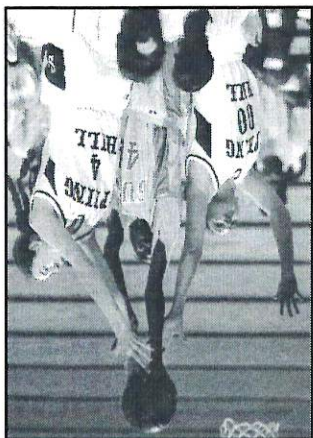

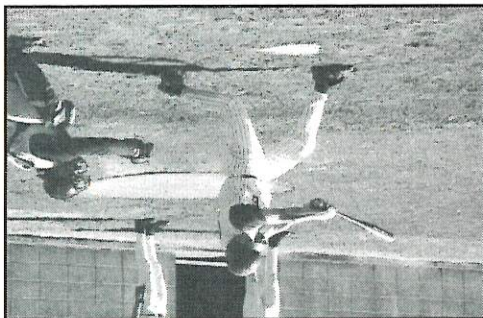

The colors for the new logos are purple (PMS 2627), grey and white. There is also usage of a 65% purple within the badger head.

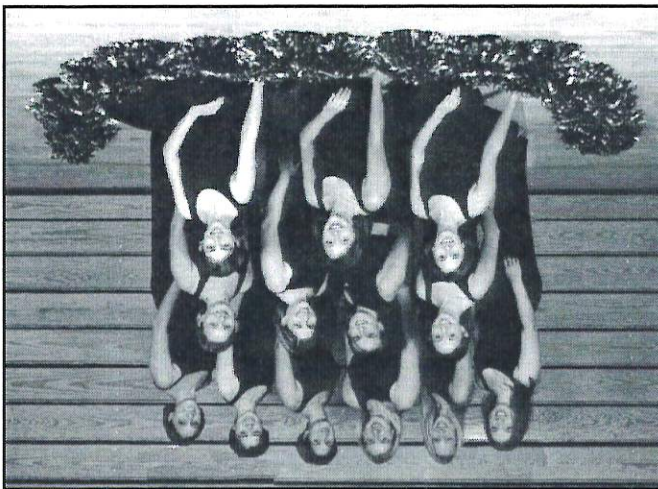

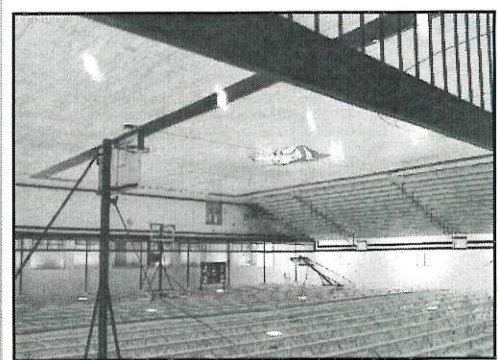
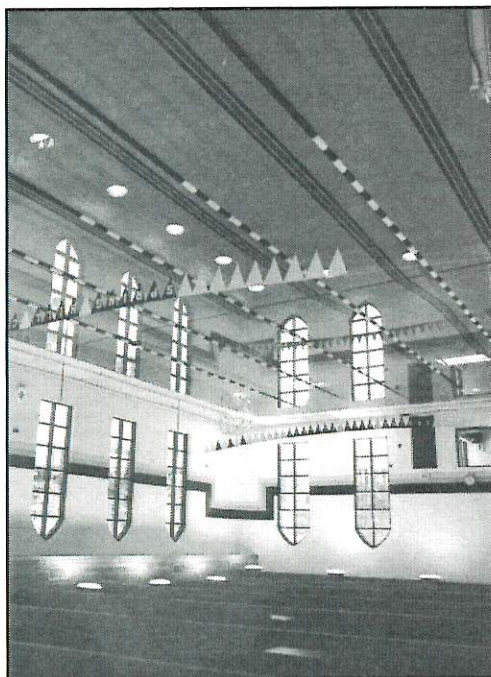
# ARTHUR R. OUTLAW RECREATION CENTER

After nearly six decades of traveling, the Spring Hill College basketball programs finally have a place to call home. Opened to the campus in June 1997, the \$7.3 million Arthur R. Outlaw Student Recreation Center is a state-of-the-art recreational facility utilized by the students, faculty and staff of Spring Hill.

The facility includes a modern weight room complete with free weights, station training and cardiovascular equipment. This equipment was graciously donated by John Burke ('63). Also included in the facility is a six-lane, 25-yard swimming pool, two racquetball courts, as well as locker room and training facilities for students and staff. Athletic Department offices and a Hall of Fame room for special receptions is housed on the upper level.

The centerpiece of the facility is the 2,000-seat gymnasium. The facility is the home for the men's and women's NAIA basketball teams and campus intramural programs. During the off season, the gymnasium's ideal size and proximity to the center of campus make it a great place to hold other campus events and activities.

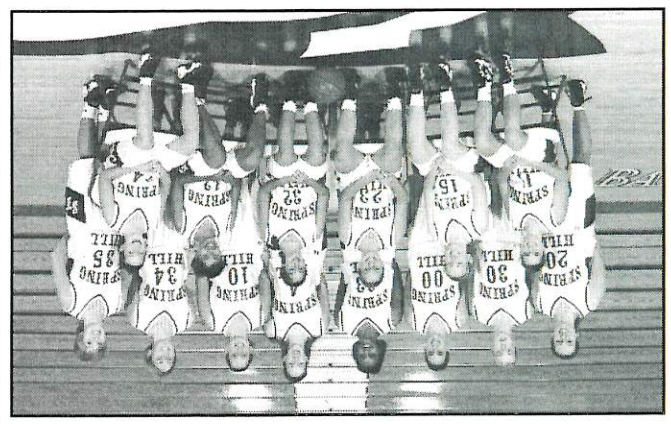

**Stephen Brown, Assistant Coach**

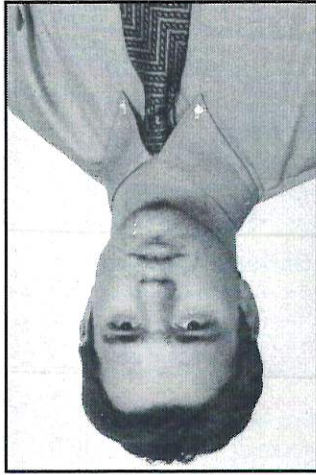

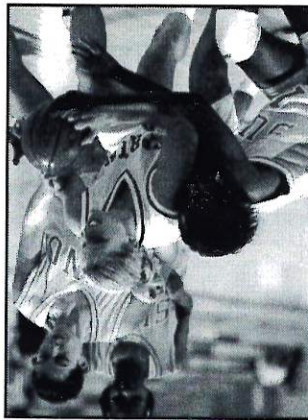

# TEAM PREVIEW



Blazened with one of the top recruiting classes in recent memory, sights are set high for the Lady Badgers this season. Despite an 8-23 record in 1998-99, the Gulf Coast Athletic second-year Head Coach Terry Fowler a glimpse of things to come, as the team returned to the GCAC Tournament for the sixth straight season, after posting a 6-12 league mark.



Last year's version of the Lady Badgers saw a team plagued with injuries and distractions, 9.5 rpg in only 19 games. Originally signed by Duke, Mcginnis "is one of the best scorers, I've been around," according to Fowler. At 6-2, Mcginnis possesses amazing versatility at being able not only to post-up, but also hit the long range 3-point jumper.

## RETURNING PLAYERS

Stuardi, as one of the five returning starters, is the Lady Badger's top player. Already the school's all-time assist leader at 398, Stuardi returns for her senior season as the heart and soul of the Badger team. Reigning from Mobile, Stuardi has built a reputation as a great passer, shooter, rebounder and defender. The Port City has seen some great point guards steam through, and Stuardi ranks up there with the best of them.

One thing opponents should watch for this season are the shooters. Last year SHC led the nation in free throw percentage (77%) and the GCAC in 3-pt shooting (38%). Along with Stuardi and Mcginnis, a core of veteran returnees are also able to scorch the bottom of the nylon. Jessica Wendolek (11.6 ppg, 6.3 rpg) is one of those players. One of the team's hardest workers, Wendolek, is beginning to understand the college game and with another year of experience under her belt, big things are expected. Up front as well is Nicolette Nalu (10.3 ppg, 6.3 rpg) who played out of position for much of last season. The team's vocal leader, Nalu is most comfortable in the post, but because of her training at guard, Nalu has the ability to play out on the wing.

Plagued by last year's injury bug was 5-5 guard Heather Wingard (9 pts, 15 reb). A fierce competitor, Wingard is expected to return from a knee injury in late December.

## NEWCOMERS

"This could be one of the best classes that I have seen in my seven years with the program," said Fowler. "They meet needs at every position and bring an attitude that's been lacking." The next century's first team is a talented bunch who are expected to contribute right away.

LaToya Baker (Bay Minette, AL) has a tremendous upside, and

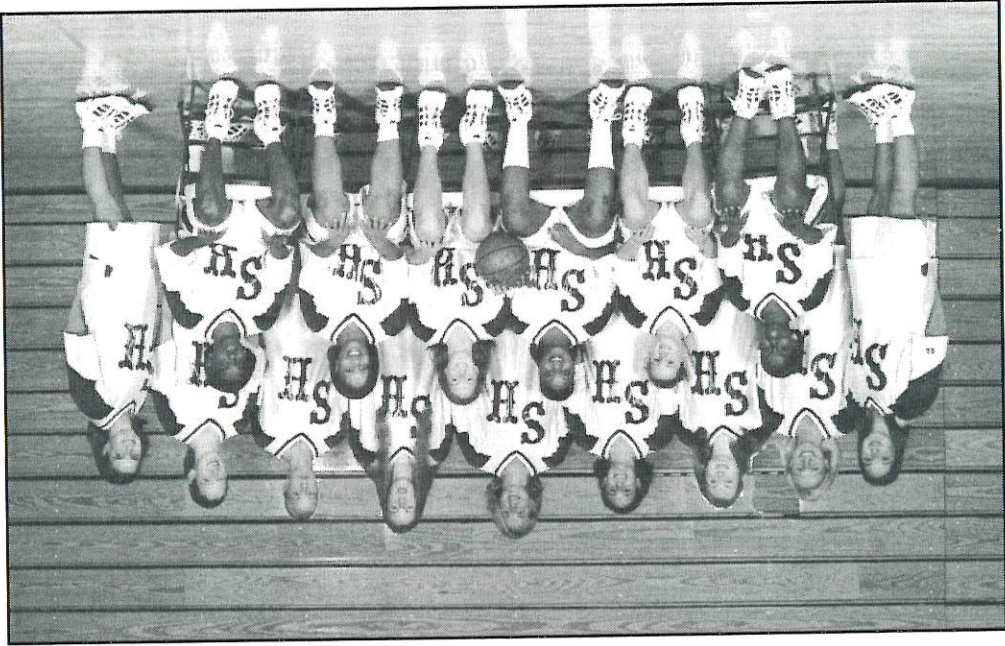

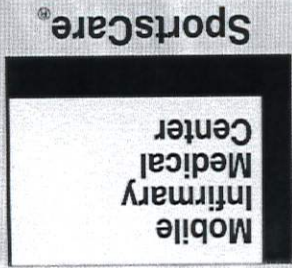
