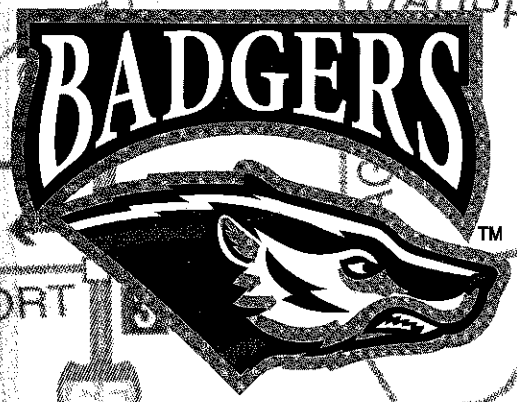
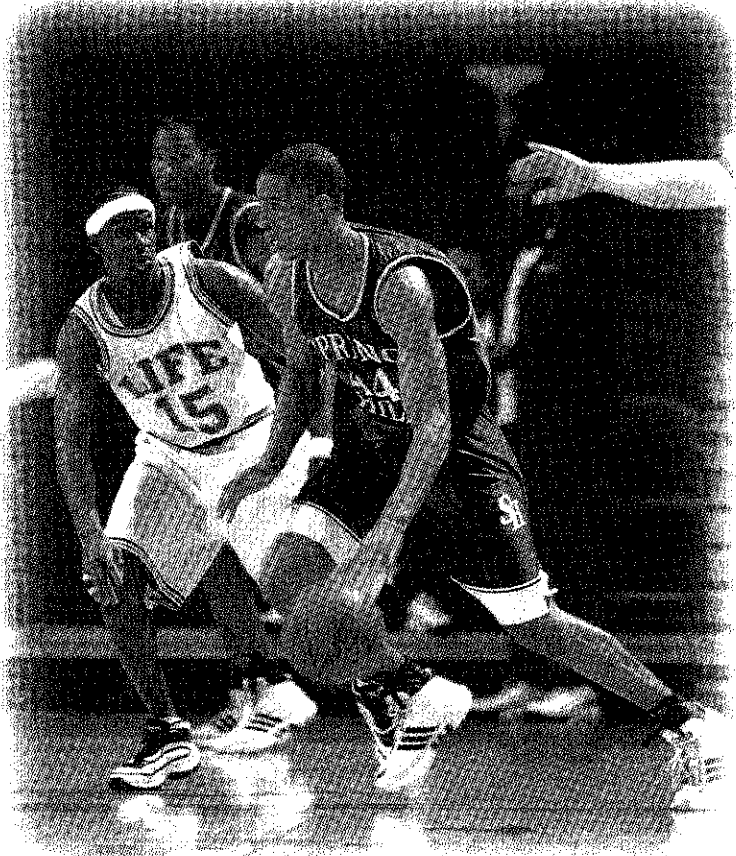


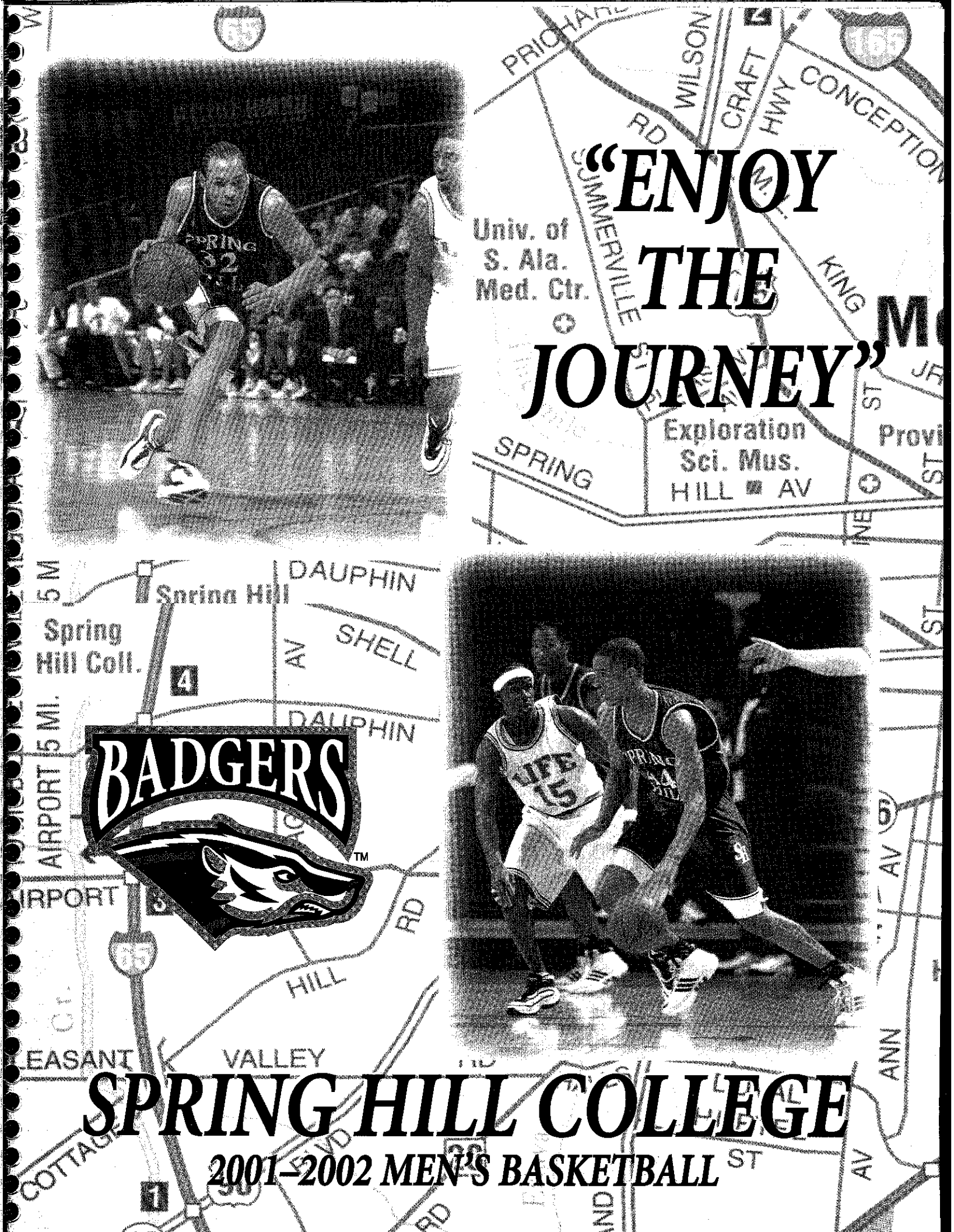

SPRING HILL ADMINISTRATION

Since becoming the 37th president at Spring Hill College on June 1, 1997, Fr. Gregory F. Lucey's leadership has made a significant impact on the College. With a "Vision for the College on the Hill," Fr. Lucey set into motion plans that have resulted in record enrollment, development of a comprehensive Campus Master Plan, and construction of a new residence hall. He has made academics and technology priorities for the College; enhancing programs and investing in faculty, while wiring each residence hall for Internet access.

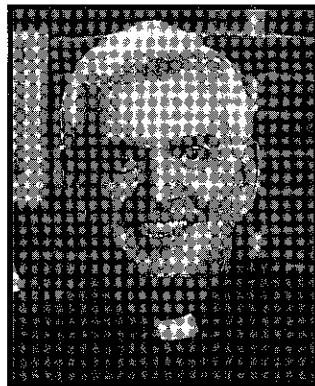
Under Fr. Lucey's direction, Spring Hill College has enjoyed record fund-raising years, including a \$3 million gift in 1998 from former Mobile Mayor and College alumnus Arthur R. Outlaw. Throughout his time at the College, Fr. Lucey's goal has been to enrich the Spring Hill Experience for every student while making the 171-year old institution a premier, small, residential, Catholic liberal arts college in the Jesuit tradition.

Prior to Spring Hill, Fr. Lucey served as president and chairman of the board of the National Jesuit Conference based in

Washington, D.C. Additionally, Fr. Lucey served as rector for the Jesuit Community at Marquette University and vice president for development at Seattle University. He received a Ph.D. in educational administration from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, an M.A. in liturgy from the University of Notre Dame, as well as undergraduate and graduate degrees in philosophy from St. Louis University.

A Wisconsin native, Fr. Lucey entered the Society of Jesus in 1951 after graduating high school at the Canpion School, an all-male boarding school in Wisconsin, and was ordained in 1964. 2001 marks his Golden Jubilee, or 50th year, as a Jesuit. His older brother, Roger, is also a Jesuit priest, while another brother, Pat, served as Governor of Wisconsin in the 1970s and was the vice presidential running mate to independent candidate John Anderson in the 1980 U.S. Presidential election.

Fr. Lucey founded and served as director of Marquette's Center for Ignatian Spirituality and in 1995, he attended the 34th General Congregation of the Society of Jesus as one of 200 delegates worldwide.

Fr. Stephen Sauer, S.J. is in his third year as the Vice President of Student Affairs, after serving on the Spring Hill staff previously as a student academic advisor, staff therapist and as director of liturgy from 1991-94. Fr. Sauer is a world traveler who has gained valuable experience from his visits to Paris, Rome and New Orleans.

He has a master's degree in counseling and student personnel psychology from the University of Minnesota and a master's degree from the Institut Catholique de Paris in Theology with a specialization in liturgy. Fr. Sauer also has a degree in theology with honors from Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome.

After originally received his bachelor's degree in psychology from Georgetown University in 1983, Fr. Sauer entered the Society of Jesus in 1985. He was ordained as a Jesuit priest in 1998.

Fr. Sauer has been a therapist, advisor and counselor with the mentally retarded, substance abusers, high-risk students and university students with family issues. He has also previously served as a music director, coordinator and cantor for various music groups.

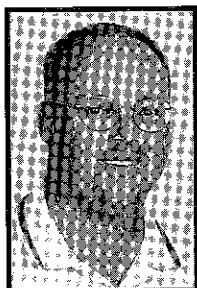

MARK PRIEDE, Athletic Director



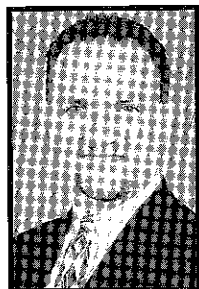
A former Spring Hill golf coach, Mark Priede is in his fourth year as Badger athletic director. Priede has the responsibility of seeing that the role of athletics at Spring Hill complements the academic mission of the college. Blessed with a strong background as a collegiate golf coach, Priede returned to Spring Hill as Athletic Director in January of 1998 after a successful stint as head golf coach at NCAA Division I University of San Francisco.

Priede's success as a golf coach at Spring Hill and the University of San Francisco brought him national recognition. While at Spring Hill from 1993-95, his women's golf team finished third in the nation in 1994 and fifth in the nation in 1995. He was named Gulf Coast Athletic Conference Golf Coach of the Year in 1995. That success continued

when he moved to the University of San Francisco in 1996 as head women's golf coach and coordinator of athletic marketing. He garnered West Coast Conference Golf Coach of the Year honors in 1997. That same year, his team won the West Coast Conference for the first time in USF history.

A former collegiate golfer at Spring Hill, Priede received his bachelor's degree from Spring Hill in 1984. He and his wife, Ann, also a Spring Hill alumna, are proud parents of twins, Allison and Drew.

LEE WRIGHT, Sports Information Director



Now in his second year as sports information director at Spring Hill, Lee Wright handles all the public and media relations for the Badger athletic department. In his first year as sports information director, Wright wrote, designed and edited exclusive media guides for men's basketball, women's basketball, baseball and softball. He's also largely responsible for the upgrades made to the athletic department website.

This is Wright's third position within the sports information field, and his first as a sports information director. Prior to his arrival on "The Hill" in August of 2000, he served for a year each as assistant sports information director at the University of West Georgia in Carrollton, GA, and at Life University in Marietta, GA. Wright is an active member of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

In addition to his duties as sports information director, Wright also has a dual role as compliance director, handling all eligibility reports for Spring Hill Athletics.

Sports journalism is where Wright got his start before entering the Sports Information field. He was a sports writer for five combined years with both The Chattanooga Times and The Marietta Daily Journal. After lettering three seasons in football at Tennessee Wesleyan College, Wright received his bachelor of arts degree in communications with a minor in economics from the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga in 1995. While an undergraduate, he was Sports Editor for The University Echo, the student newspaper at UTC.

An avid weightlifter and fitness enthusiast, Lee and his wife, Jennifer, reside in midtown Mobile.

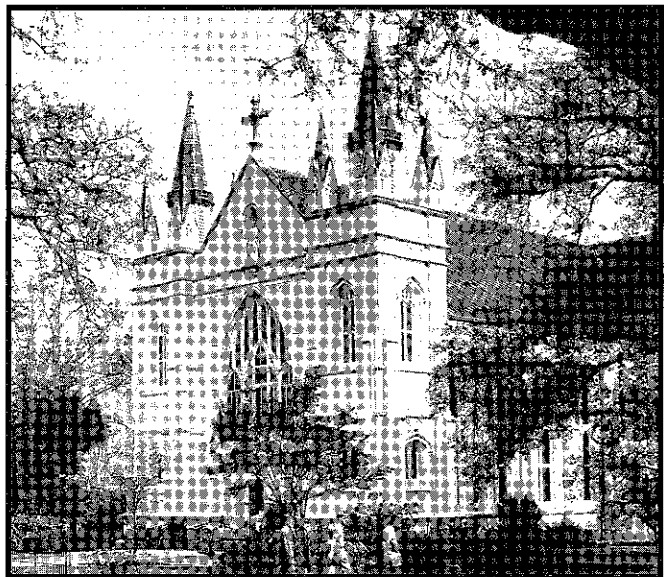


The Spring Hill College community invites you to discover a special place called "The Hill." A Jesuit, Catholic liberal arts college founded in 1830, Spring Hill is a close knit community where faculty prepare students for life—not just a career.

Because of the small classes, averaging 17 undergraduates per class, the students form close bonds—partnerships with each other as well as with Spring Hill's faculty and staff. The Spring Hill community takes the time and makes the effort to form caring, enduring relationships.

This concern for the individual person, what the Jesuits traditionally have called cura personalis, is a fundamental characteristic of the College community. This personalized care allows each student to develop individually while sharing in the ideals of the Spring Hill community.

Enrollment is 1,000 students, 65% women, 18% minority and 70% from out of state. The campus is located in the heart of Mobile on 300-acres of greenery, including an 18-hole golf course. There are two 15-week semesters (fall and spring); two 2-week sessions following the spring; and one 6-week summer session.

RESIDENCE HALLS

As a Spring Hill student, you are provided four-year guaranteed housing in campus residence halls and apartments. Ninety percent of freshmen and 65 percent of the total student body live on campus. There are six residence halls. Each is fully air conditioned and equipped with a coin-operated laundry facility. In addition, every residence hall has a study lounge. Each residence hall has a Resident Assistant (R.A.) who is an upperclass student selected on the basis of his/her leadership ability and concern for fellow students. A hall director also resides in the hall and supervises the RA's and advises the Hall Council.

Fraternities, sororities, student government, campus ministry, service and social clubs, theatre clubs, student publications and many other academic and honorary organizations add an important dimension to the Spring Hill experience.

Located in the student center, the Dining Room offers breakfast, lunch and dinner on the weekdays, and brunch and dinner on the weekends. The Cloister offers quick meals on the go, while the Golf Shop provides a menu of sandwiches, snacks and beverages.

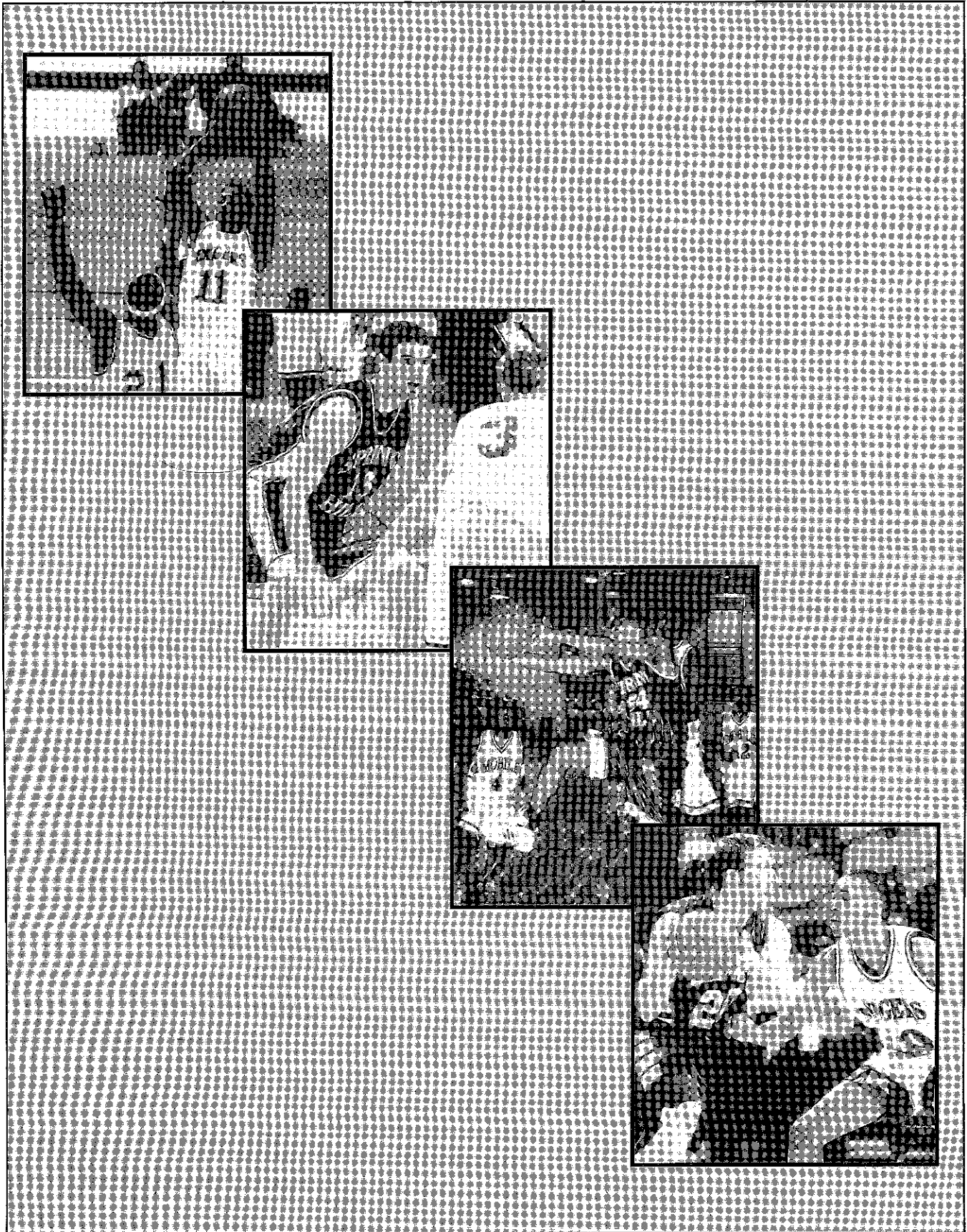

2001-2002 OUTLOOK



2001-2002 SEASON PREVIEW

Expectations are never small at Spring Hill College in terms of men's basketball, and the upcoming 2001-2002 season is no exception.

The Badgers are coming off their second consecutive 29-8 season, which included another trip to the "Elite Eight" of the NAIA National Tournament and final ranking of 12th in the nation. Factor that in with a strong nucleus of returning players, mixed in with a promising recruiting class, and Spring Hill has the makings of another banner season.

As he enters his third season at the Badger helm, head coach Bill Carr's approach isn't any different from when he took over a team made up of no seniors and nine freshmen and led them to the "Elite Eight" two seasons ago. The Badgers enter the season once again the favorite to win the Gulf Coast Athletic Conference championship, and are ranked third nationally in the NAIA in the Street and Smith Preseason College Basketball Preview.

"The expectations are a reflection on how hard everyone works in the program, from the coaches, to the players, to the administration which allows you to have success," said Carr, 58-16 in his two seasons on "The Hill." "It's an honor, but we have to win the games, produce, perform and see how we come out in the end. That's more important than how you begin."

Carr and his assistants have assembled a team different from the previous seasons. The Badgers have added size, strength, athleticism, versatility and depth. All five starters return from last season, as well as five more players who saw considerable action. Add six talented recruits to the mix, and the potential is unlimited.

However, Carr sees a different improvement in the squad. There's more focus and an attention to detail than any of the two previous seasons under Carr.

"I think our improvement has been more mental," Carr said. "Examples of that

include consistency in practice, the ability to play through pain and not be distracted, the ability to play harder for a longer period of time and concentrate longer.

"Experience is a big factor. We've got guys that have played in a lot of big games, but I still see a lot of competition in terms of starting positions and playing minutes. As soon as our new players learn the system, they'll be pushing the older guys."

Certain returning players have been through the wars, and three in particular are returning All-GCAC forwards Tony Younger, Richard Millsap and Shawn

McKee.

A 6-foot-6, 210-pound senior, Younger starts the final season of a brilliant career at Spring Hill. He's coming off a season in which he averaged 11 points, five rebounds and four assists a game as the "point forward" in Carr's motion offense attack. He also became the 26th player in Spring Hill history to eclipse 1,000 career points and now ranks 21st on the all-time Badger scoring list.

Carr would like to play Younger more on the wing. But he's not afraid to give Younger the ball at a moment's notice if it's for the good of the team.

"The thing with Tony Younger is he'll do anything you ask him to do as long as it helps the team win," Carr said. "He's going to have to score more and be more aggressive, and we'll move him around from the point to the post so teams can't focus on him in one position."

A transfer last season from Alabama State, the 6-6, 215-pound Millsap fit in well to the system, averaging 10 points and six rebounds, while giving the Badgers some extra dimensions with his athleticism and explosiveness off the dribble. He came on strong in the second half of the season, moving his game to a higher level.

"Millsap's second half of the season last year was as good as I've seen since I've been here. He carried us for the last 14 games and got us to the final eight again, and his dedication and commitment has been even better in the fall."

A 6-5, 200-pound junior, McKee was the team's leading scorer, averaging 12 points and six rebounds a contest. He lacks only 10 points from becoming the 27th player in Spring Hill history to reach 1,000 points for his career.

"Shawn's work ethic has allowed him to become an all-conference player," Carr said. "He leads by example everyday in practice."

2001-2002 SEASON PREVIEW

"Those three (Younger, Millsap and McKee) are talented, they work hard and they care about winning and putting the team above individual goals," Carr said. "However, there's a good group of players that don't get the exposure—players like (Reggie) Warren, (Isaac) Levy and (Eric) Olen.

"These three are the nuts and bolts of this program, and without them, this program wouldn't have the success it has had recently."

Olen (6-4, 190), a junior guard, and Warren (6-8, 215), a junior forward, are both potential All-GCAC candidates, while Levy (5-11, 165), a junior point guard has started off and on over the last two seasons.

"Reggie showed great improvement last season, and was a big reason why we returned to the 'Elite Eight,'" Carr said. "Isaac gives us great leadership at the point. He loves to win and often wills his team to wins by making big plays.

"Eric, like Isaac, does a lot of things not seen by the average fan. However, everyone in the program knows how important his competitive spirit is to this team."

Spring Hill added more depth in every area of the team, but none is more obvious than in the post. McKee and Warren give the Badgers two quality post players. Warren averaged nine points and seven rebounds last season, earning his way into the starting lineup.

Add 6-4, 200-pound sophomore Courtney Bloom, plus freshmen Nick Ellingsworth-Perez (6-7, 215) and Casey Johnson (6-9, 210), and the Badgers are bigger, stronger and deeper in the paint.

"I don't think this current addition of Spring Hill basketball will be considered a power team," Carr said. "Our post play is going to be fine. They don't stray far from the basket, but they do have the skills to duck in, seal and lay the ball in the basket."

Like the post, the point guard position is also a deep area for the Badgers. In addition to Younger and Levy, sophomores Nate Williams (5-11, 170) and Pete Arner (5-11, 165) both gained considerable experience last season and have learned the system well, while 6-1, 165-pound freshman Lucas Picarelli has unlimited playmaking potential with his ball handling and passing abilities.

"If you put Isaac, Nate, Pete and Lucas together, we're very strong and deep at the point," Carr said. "They each bring different strengths to the position, they know what I want, and as soon as they fall in line with that, it's only going to add to our strength."

Another area of strength is the perimeter shooting,



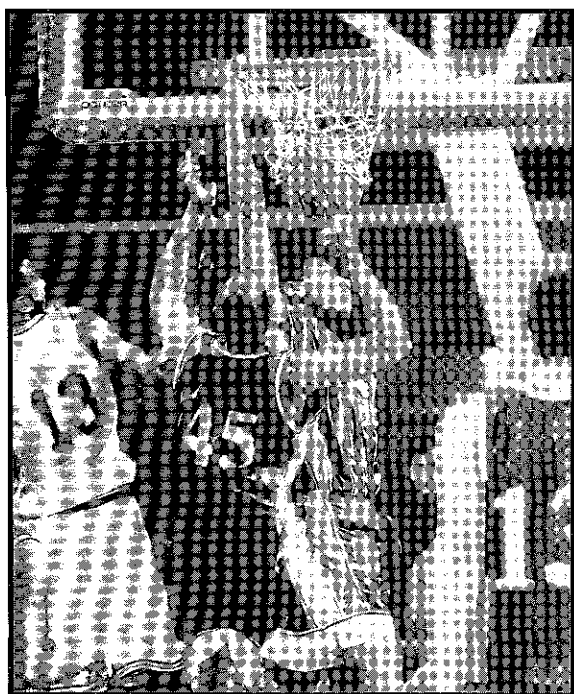
Junior guard Eric Olen is one of many shooting threats from the perimeter in the Badger arsenal

and there's no shortage of weapons on the wings. Along with Millsap, Olen averaged nine points and shot almost 40 percent from 3-point range, while 6-2, 165-pound sophomore Pierre Du Ventre broke in with a solid freshman campaign, averaging four points while leading the team in both 3-point shooting percentage (51 percent) and free throw shooting (87 percent).

Freshmen Nick Long (6-5, 190), Chris Miernicki (6-4, 185) and Gabi Garcia (6-1, 190) bring new enthusiasm, not to mention athleticism and shooting ability to the wing area.

"Eric has made some big shots, but more importantly, makes big plays," Carr said. "Nick Long's ability to shoot the ball and defend as a bigger guard will help, and the other guys will add great depth to this position."

The Badgers won't shy away from stiff competition, as the 2001-2002 schedule reflects. Included in the pre-conference slate is defending NAIA national champion Faulkner, plus three-time NAIA national champion Life and three-time NCAA Division II national champion Cal-State Bakersfield. Spring Hill opens the season on Nov. 2 against Daemen (N.Y.) in the Wells Fargo Hall of Fame Classic. The first GCAC contest is Jan. 5 at home against Jesuit school rival Loyola.

BADGER COACHING STAFF



HEAD COACH BILL CARR



Two years—two seasons of excellence for Bill Carr as head coach of the Spring Hill Badgers.

Since his introduction as the Badgers' head coach on Aug. 9, 1999, the results have been nothing short of superb for the 36 year-old native of Glendale, CA.

Spring Hill has posted consecutive 29-win seasons under Carr, and have advanced to the "Elite Eight" of the NAIA National Tournament each of those seasons. In addition, the Badgers won the 1999-2000 Gulf Coast Athletic Conference

championship, were runner-ups in last season's GCAC Tournament, and also had the top-rated defensive team in the NAIA during the 2000-2001 season.

With seven 20-win seasons in the previous eight years prior to his arrival, Carr, the 11th head coach in Spring Hill since 1946, knew he was inheriting a program with tradition. But he's built on that tradition and is working on leaving his own legacy.

Carr has taken the tradition to another level. With a 58-16 mark as head coach, Carr's winning percentage of .784 is tops among all head coaches in the history of Badger basketball. In turn, the Badgers have transformed themselves into one of the elite powers in the NAIA.

His first team, which consisted of no seniors and nine freshmen, finished with an amazing 29-8 mark and 16-2 in the Gulf Coast Athletic Conference. The Badgers defeated St. Vincent and Oklahoma City in the first two rounds of the NAIA National Tournament in Tulsa, OK, before falling in the quarterfinals to Olivet Nazarene. Spring Hill was ranked 11th in the final NAIA national poll, and Carr was honored as GCAC Coach of the Year and was a finalist for NAIA National Coach of the Year.

Last season, the Badgers picked up where they left off, finishing again at 29-8 and 12-4 in the GCAC after starting the season ranked fourth in the preseason NAIA Top 25. They defeated two-time defending national champion Life and Columbia in the first two rounds of the NAIA National Tournament, before Science and Arts edged Spring Hill in the quarterfinals. The Badgers were ranked 12th in the final NAIA National poll.

In arriving at Spring Hill two years ago, Carr moved from one Jesuit institution to another. He spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his Alma Mater, the University of San Francisco.

A proven recruiter and strategist, Carr helped land 10 First-Team All-West Coast Conference standouts to the City by the Bay, including the 1998 and 1999 Freshmen of the Year honorees in the WCC.

As the top assistant under head coach Philip Mathews, Carr helped

propel the Dons back to the NCAA Tournament in 1998, their first appearance in the "Big Dance" since 1982. Although San Francisco lost in the first round to eventual national finalist Utah, Carr had become a large component in moving the program full circle.

The San Francisco connection for Carr dates back more than 15 years to when he was a player with the Dons. A shooting guard, he played two seasons from 1985-1987, including the "Back to Basketball" squad of 1985-86, the first season of the program's restart after a three-year hiatus. During that time, Carr was noted as a dead-eye perimeter shooter. He appeared in 34 games in two seasons at San Francisco, connecting on 50 percent (7-for-14) from 3-point range. In addition, Carr shot 82 percent from the free throw line as a junior and 88 percent as a senior.

Prior to transferring to San Francisco, Carr enjoyed a stellar two-year career as an All-Inland Valley Conference guard at Glendale Junior College, where he averaged 16 points and six assists per game.

After receiving his bachelor of science degree in accounting from USF, Carr joined a Big Eight accounting firm in the San Francisco area. However, it took him only two years to realize his true love was coaching basketball, so Carr returned to the "Hilltop" in 1990 as an assistant under his coaching mentor, Jim Brovelli.

Carr and his wife, Pam, are the proud parents of three children—Allie (9), Madison (5) and Paul (2). The Carrs reside in Mobile.

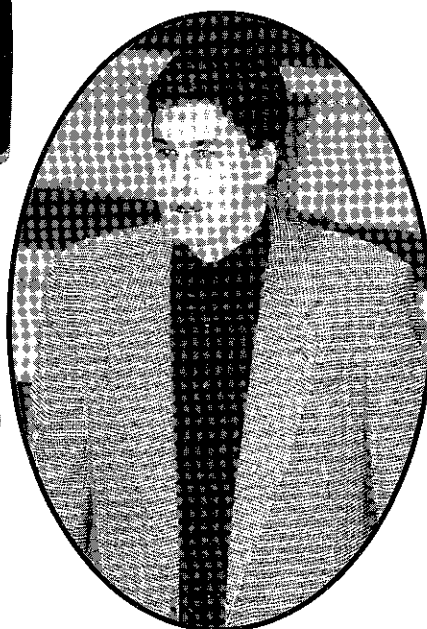

Q & A

WITH BILL CARR



BASED ON THE RECENT SUCCESS OF YOUR PROGRAM, MOST NOTABLY THE "ELITE EIGHT" APPEARANCES IN THE NAIA NATIONAL TOURNAMENT EACH OF THE LAST TWO SEASONS, WHAT IS YOUR APPROACH AS PRACTICE STARTED THIS FALL?

"This is a new year for Spring Hill basketball. What we have done in the past has nothing to do with the success of this team. We have gone out with the approach of teaching every aspect of our system as if it's new to everyone in the program. We are going back to the basics and spending a great deal of time on the details. A lot of our early development has been mental more than physical."

CONSIDERING THE PRESEASON POLLS, EXPECTATIONS ARE AGAIN HIGH FOR YOUR TEAM. HOW DO YOU HANDLE THAT?

"To get preseason recognition is very flattering to our program. It certainly is a compliment to the effort of our players, our coaching staff and to the administration, which allow us to compete at a very high level. We must learn, however, that the games must still be played and it is not where you are ranked at the beginning of the season, it's all about where and how you finish."

WHAT ARE THE GOALS OF THIS TEAM?

"The main goal for this team is to get better everyday and to improve every game. We must stay in the present and try and take care of business at hand. If we can do this we can then begin to think about the GCAC conference titles and NAIA national titles."

YOU HAVE AS MANY AS 10 PLAYERS WHO SAW CONSIDERABLE AMOUNT OF ACTION LAST SEASON. DOES THIS EXPERIENCE CHANGE YOUR PHILOSOPHY APPROACHING THE SEASON?

"Our experience is very important to our success this year if we use it the proper way. The returning players have played in, and won, quite a few big games the last two years. If we become mature enough to understand what it took to win those games then yes I think our experiences will help our success this year. Our approach and philosophy does not change however. We still must put in the work and concentrate on becoming a team that can withstand the ups and downs of a college basketball season."

TALK SPECIFICALLY ABOUT YOUR RETURNING ALL-GCAC PLAYERS, FORWARDS TONY YOUNGER, RICHARD MILLSAP AND SHAWN MCKEE.

"Tony, Richard and Shawn are the guys who start our attack, both offensively and defensively. All three play extremely hard and understand our system at a high level. They are remarkably unselfish and always put the team's success above any personal numbers or awards. The beauty of this trio is they all understand they can still get better and they continue to strive to know the system better. They never stop working hard and learning which is a great example to the younger players in our program."

WHAT ABOUT THE OTHER RETURNING PLAYERS?

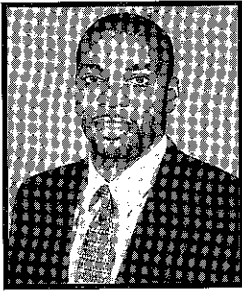
"This is the group that allows us to be successful. They are the guys who understand their roles and play them perfectly. Reggie, Isaac and Eric have been here two years and have all been instrumental in big wins and building a foundation for the program. They are the "nuts and bolts" group. Making plays, that no one notices, which lead to victories. Pierre, Courtney, Pete and Nate will all contribute for us this year."

TELL US ABOUT THIS YEAR'S RECRUITING CLASS AND ITS POTENTIAL.

"First and foremost, a lot of credit for this fine class must go to assistant coaches Tom Kenna and Mike Floyd. They evaluated and identified the right players for our system. Casey, Nick, Lucas and Nick are all going to be tremendous assets to our program. They bring a great deal of enthusiasm and talent to our program. I look for all of them to make an immediate impact for the Badgers."

WHAT ARE YOUR IMPRESSIONS OF THIS YEAR'S GULF COAST ATHLETIC CONFERENCE RACE?

"The GCAC will be very strong from top to bottom. There are many fine players in this conference that play under the national radar. When people come out to watch our league for the first time they are always amazed by the talent level. When you add the great coaching that takes place night in and night out there is no such thing as a night off in the GCAC. As always, it will come down to which team is able to win at home and then steal a few on the road. In order to win on the road in this conference you must be extremely focused and not allow yourself to be distracted."

Proving to be a tremendous addition to the Badger coaching staff last season, Michael Floyd begins his second stint on the Badger bench. If his name sounds familiar

around the Mobile area, that's no surprise. Floyd was an All-State standout at Mobile's McGill-Toolen High School before moving on to a collegiate career at the University of South Alabama, then at Murray State.

Floyd brings a wealth of basketball knowledge to the Badgers from a distinguished playing career, having played for some of the top coaches at the NCAA Division I level, particularly Bill Musselman, Mark Gottfried and Tevester Anderson. He will again assist with on-court coaching, scouting, recruiting and working with the Badger post players.

Tom Kenna begins his third season on the Badger staff after serving as an assistant coach at his alma mater St. Thomas University (FL) during the 1998-

1999 season. Kenna, 26, will be responsible for many of the administrative duties within the men's basketball program, including recruiting, scheduling and team travel arrangements. Over the past two seasons, the Miami native has gained a reputation for recruiting, especially within his home state. Three members of this season's recruiting class hail from the Sunshine State.

The basketball program isn't the only aspect of Kenna's duties this season. He also serves as the Director of the Arthur R. Outlaw Recreation Center, overseeing the operations of the center and intramurals.

As a player, Kenna's quiet leadership, determined attitude, hard work and dedication propelled him to the forefront. As a senior guard at St. Thomas, Kenna shot 43 percent from 3-point range and helped lead his team to the Florida Sun Conference Championship and a berth in the NAIA Division II National Tournament.

Cranford graduated (summa cum laude) with a bachelor's degree in sports management from Faulkner in 1996, and completed his master's degree in exercise science at South Alabama last spring. He is employed with the Daphne Parks Department and he and his wife, Melaura, reside in Daphne.

Howard Athletic Training Fellowship, a joint venture between Auburn University and Auburn's Hughston Clinic.

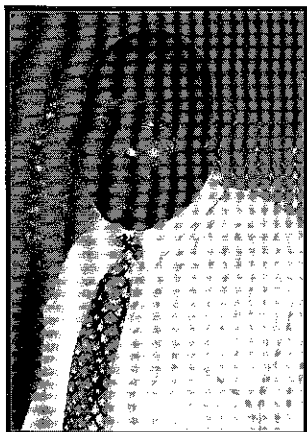
Mackin currently resides in Daphne, and is engaged to be married to Spring Hill head softball coach Coby Cashion on Nov. 24 of this year.

2000-2001 SEASON IN REVIEW

BADGERS DUPLICATE 1999-2000 SUCCESS WITH 29-8 MARK AND ANOTHER NAIA "ELITE EIGHT" APPEARANCE

Coming off a banner season in which they went 29-8 and advanced to the "Elite Eight" of the NAIA National Tournament, the expectations were higher than normal for the Spring Hill Badgers in the 2000-2001 campaign. The questions arose—was the 1999-2000 season a fluke? Could they repeat that success?

The Badgers answered those expectations with ringing results, completing yet another 29-win season and returning to the "Elite Eight" of the NAIA National Tournament for a second straight season.

There was an unlimited amount of talent last season, since the Badgers lost no seniors from the 1999-2000 team. Back was junior All-Gulf Coast Athletic Conference forward Tony Younger and sophomore All-GCAC forward Shawn McKee.

Add senior center Nicky Saacks and senior guard Shane Cline, plus sophomore guards Eric Olen, Isaac Levy, Derrick Kibler and sophomore forward Reggie Warren, and the base was more than solid for Spring Hill. In addition, five newcomers led by junior forward Richard Millsap, a transfer from Alabama State, added more fuel to the fire.

Unfortunately, Saacks missed all of the preseason while rehabilitating from off season knee surgery, while Olen was out for most of the first month of practice with a back injury. Both players missed the first nine games of the regular season.

However, that didn't slow down the Badgers, who started the season ranked fourth in the NAIA Preseason Top 25. Spring Hill opened with seven straight victories, including an impressive 71-53 thumping over

10th-ranked Campbellsville in the season-opening Wells Fargo Financial Hall of Fame Classic on Nov. 4 as Younger scored 21 points. The Badgers suffered their first defeat of the season on Nov. 21, falling 72-70 to Knoxville. That ended Spring Hill's 21-game home winning streak.

Olen and Saacks each returned in mid-December and their presence was felt as the Badgers won six of their next seven games, including a 99-83 victory at Knoxville in which McKee scored a career-high 33 points. That was followed two impressive victories over Mount Vernon Nazarene and Dakota State at the Sailfish Shootout in West Palm Beach, FL., on Dec. 29-30.

But that came with a price as Saacks re-injured his knee against Dakota State and was out the rest of the season.

With a 13-2 pre-conference record, the Badgers prepared for the upcoming GCAC slate. Getting that started was an adventure in itself

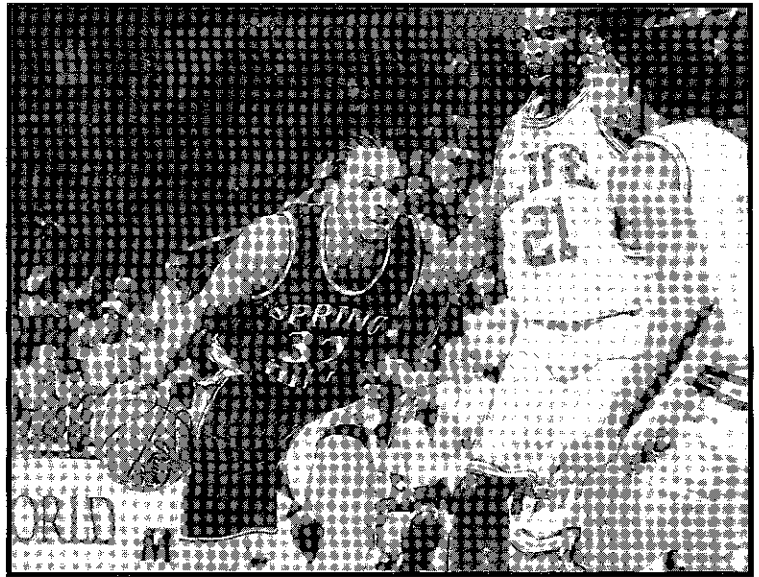
First, the conference opener against Southern-New Orleans, which was slated for Jan. 6, was rescheduled three times before finally getting set

on Jan. 15 at Spring Hill.

The Badgers, ranked sixth in the NAIA at that time, opened the conference schedule on Jan. 11 against 19th-ranked Xavier at the Outlaw Center, and the visiting Gold Rush prevailed with a 69-63 victory. Spring Hill recovered with a convincing victory at Jesuit rival Loyola, but Southern-New Orleans rallied from an eight-point deficit in the final 45 seconds to steal a 66-65 victory over the Badgers in the make-up date.

At 1-2 in the GCAC, Spring Hill needed a lift. The Badgers responded to the adversity, whipping both Talladega and Tougaloo at home to set up the first of two "Battle of the Port City" confrontations on Jan. 27 at arch-rival Mobile. Spring Hill entered the game looking for its first victory at Pharr Gymnasium in three years, and the Badgers got it, whipping the Rams 71-51 behind 18 points from Younger.

William Carey briefly slowed down the Badger charge with a 61-57 victory on Jan. 29, but the Badgers came back with a 67-55 victory over a dangerous Dillard squad and a 31-point rout over Loyola on Feb. 5.

2000-2001 SEASON IN REVIEW

Winless Talladega stood in the Badgers' way on Feb. 8, but Spring Hill escaped with a 72-64 to clinch its ninth 20-win season in the last 10 seasons.

At 20-5 and 7-3 in the GCAC, Spring Hill prepared for a crucial three-game road swing to New Orleans against Dillard, Xavier and Southern-New Orleans. Dillard was first on Feb. 12, in which Spring Hill rallied from a 14-point first half deficit to tie the game with 10 seconds remaining. But a turnaround jump shot by the Devils' Lancelot Lonke with four seconds remaining gave Dillard a 75-73 victory.

With their backs to the wall, the Badgers faced a tough atmosphere at "The Barn" against Xavier on Feb. 15. Spring Hill showed its defensive prowess, limiting a potent Xavier team to only one basket in the final nine minutes of the game as the Badgers pulled out a 54-45 victory. That was followed by Southern-New Orleans on Feb. 17, where Spring Hill took care of some "unfinished business," wrecking the Knights 70-59.

The Badgers returned to the Outlaw Center on Feb. 19, drilling William Carey 65-52, and later fended off a furious second half rally at Tougaloo on Feb. 22 to win 74-70.

That set up the regular season finale on Feb. 24 against Mobile. With a near-capacity crowd at the Outlaw Center, Spring Hill overwhelmed the visiting Rams as Younger scored a season-high 24 points.

The Badgers' regular season concluded at 25-6 and 12-4 in the GCAC with a final regular season ranking of 12th in the NAIA Top 25 National Poll.

Spring Hill was seeded third in the GCAC Tournament on Mar. 1-3 at the

Alario Center in New Orleans. The Badgers opened in the quarterfinals against Southern-New Orleans and used a stellar defensive effort to wear down the Knights 64-49.

Xavier was next in semifinals, and the defense continued. Spring Hill hit a season-high 12 3-point baskets, while holding the Gold Rush 30 points under its season scoring average in a

64-46 victory. Olen connected on four 3-point baskets to lead Spring Hill with 17 points. That set up the championship against Dillard.

However, the last second was kind to Dillard again as A.C. Harris penetrated the lane and nailed a five-foot jump shot with two seconds remaining for a 53-52 Devil victory.

The Badgers were a little down, but definitely not out. Waiting in the wings and the NAIA National Tournament. Spring Hill was seeded 12th in the

tournament and drew the challenging first-round task of trying to knock off two-time defending national champion Life on Mar. 15.

Not many people gave the Badgers a chance against the Running Eagles, but Spring Hill played its game in the first round. The Badgers controlled the tempo and made 83 percent (33-for-40) of their free throws in a 73-62 victory.

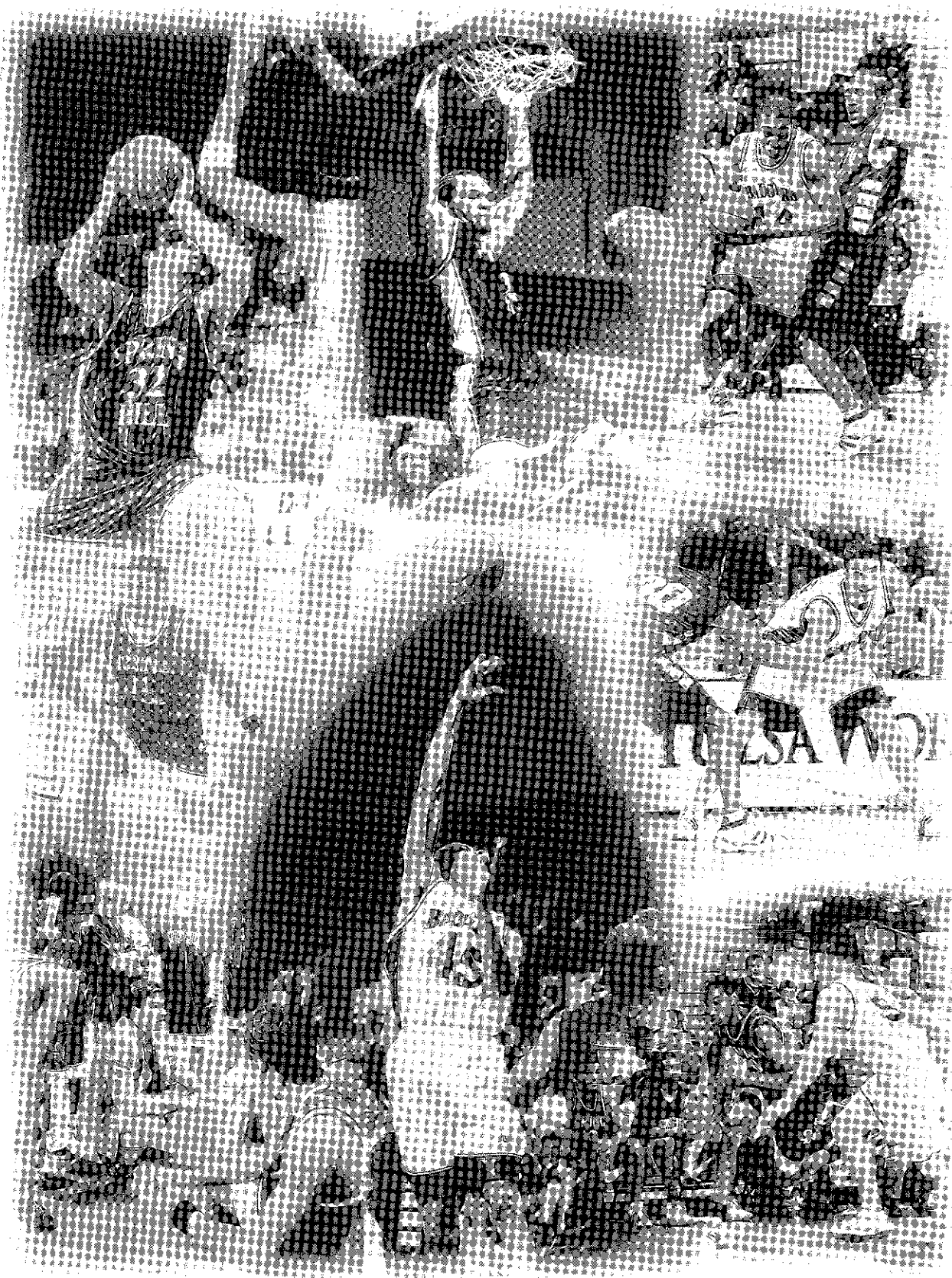
In the second round or the "Sweet 16," Spring Hill faced fifth-seeded Columbia, which entered the game with a 29-3 mark. But what appeared to be the most anticipated second-round match up turned into a rout as the Badgers rolled to an impressive 69-43 victory. Spring Hill continued its hot free throw shooting, hitting 22-for-26 (85 percent), while Millsap recorded a double-double with 19 points and 11 rebounds.

So it was back to the "Elite Eight," and a showdown against local power Science and Arts. Spring Hill managed to lead 28-23 at halftime despite shooting 28 percent from the floor. The Badgers stretched the lead to 10 points before the Drovers began a final push. Trailing 54-50, Science and Arts used a late run to pull out a 63-57 victory.

The 2000-2001 season also had many individual accomplishments. Younger was selected All-GCAC for a third consecutive season, while McKee was selected for a second straight season and Millsap was honored for the first time as All-GCAC.

Of the Badger players, only Cline and Saacks graduate, so the bar of expectations will rise even higher for the Badgers in 2001-2002.

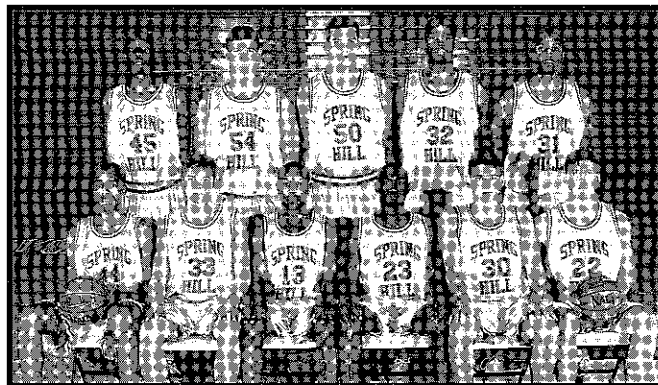

Throughout its history, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) has provided strong leadership for all aspects of intercollegiate sports. Since its introduction of intercollegiate championship basketball in 1937, the NAIA has maintained the highest standards, while administering first-rate athletic programs.

Time and again, the NAIA has stepped forward to address the important issues of the day—be it racial integration in the 1940's and 1950s or the establishment of the first women's championship program in 1980. The NAIA has not been afraid to enact changes while others have watched and waited.

In the past decade, presidents of the NAIA colleges and universities have assumed a position of responsible leadership. The NAIA's Council of Presidents, the organization's primary governing body, is comprised of 32 colleges and university presidents from all regions of the United States.

With its major emphasis on educational development, it was natural for the NAIA to further strengthen academic eligibility requirements in the mid-80s. All NAIA student-athletes must maintain a certain grade point average (GPA) while accumu-

lating credit hours for a declared academic degree.

Unlike other associations, NAIA student-athlete academic eligibility is monitored on a term-by-term basis. The all-America Scholar Athlete program, a long-standing NAIA tradition, recognizes junior and senior student-athletes with a minimum GPA of 3.5 (on a 4.0 scale). This past year, more than 700 NAIA student-athletes were so honored, representing 345 member institutions.

During the 1990's, the waves of change once again washed over the NAIA. The membership voted to institute affiliated conference and regional groupings and discontinue the use of district play as a means of qualifying for National Championships; making the first time since the NAIA's creation that district competition would not be used.

Since 1937, the NAIA has administered athletic programs and championships in proper balance with the overall collegiate educational experience. Serving higher education in this manner is a responsibility the NAIA does not take lightly. It is a relationship built on confidence and trust—a relationship strengthened year after year. The future of 60,000 young people is too important to handle any other way.

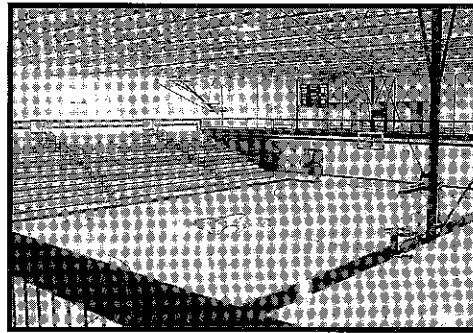
ARTHUR OUTLAW RECREATION CENTER

Outlaw Student Recreation Center is a state-of-the-art recreational facility utilized by the students, faculty and staff of Spring Hill.

"Home" has been sweet for the Badgers as they've posted a 54-6 record in the Outlaw Center during the previous four seasons.

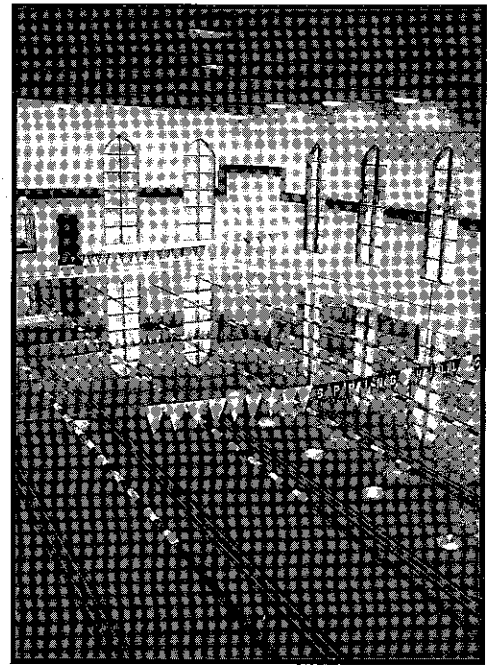
The facility includes a modern weight room complete with free weights, station training and cardiovascular equipment. This equipment was graciously donated by John Burke ('63).

Also included in the facility is a six-lane, 25-yard



swimming pool, two racquetball courts, a dance/aerobics studio, as well as locker room and training facilities for students and staff. Athletic Department offices and a Hall of Fame room for special receptions is housed on the upper level.

The centerpiece of the facility is the 2,000-seat gymnasium. The facility is the home for the men's and women's basketball teams, the volleyball team and campus intramural programs. During the off season, the gymnasium's ideal size and proximity to the center of campus make it a great place to hold other campus events and activities.

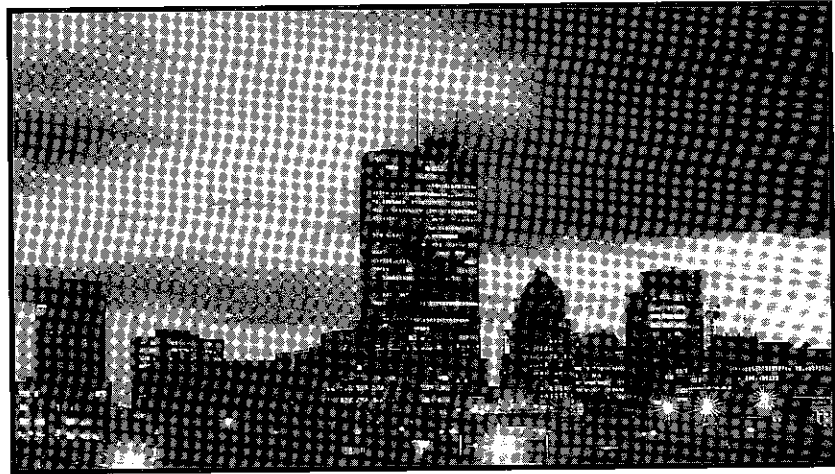

The international trade sustained by Mobile throughout her 300-year history has provided even the earliest settlers with the finer things from Europe, England, the Mediterranean and the Orient. Mobile's five historic house-museums are open to the public year-round, display artifacts native to this land and treasures brought from far away.

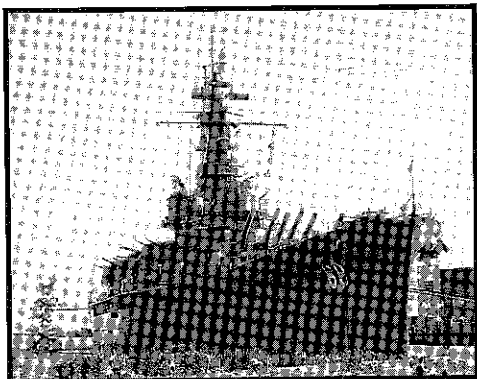
Grand houses and public buildings, each with their own distinctive charm, reflect the builders' and owners' tastes and heritage. Festivals and observance of religious holidays were not forgotten by early settlers. From its founding in 1702, Mobile has celebrated Christmas, "Boef Gras" (now called Mardi Gras), Lent, Easter and more. Modern-day festivals now include the Azalea Trail Run and Festival (March), Providence Festival of Flowers (March), Bay Fest (October), Kwanza (December) and First Night Mobile (December).

The City also offers Spring Hill College, University of Mobile and University of South Alabama athletic events; Mobile Bay Bears minor league baseball; and Mobile Mysticks' minor league hockey games. For the 2001-2002 season, two new professional teams will make Mobile home—the Mobile Revelers of the NBA's National Basketball Developmental League (NBDL) and the Mobile Wizards of Arena Football 2. 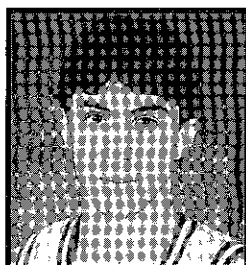

It is no wonder that words such as "southern hospitality," "charm," and "beauty," are frequently used to describe this 300-year-old Port City.

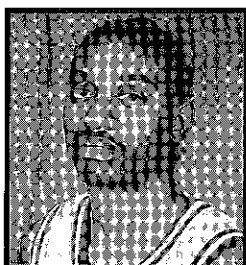
