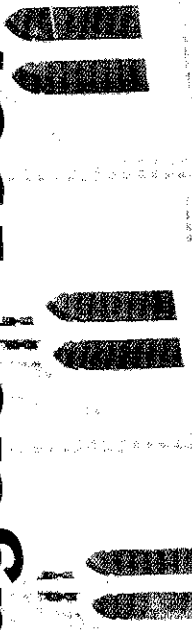
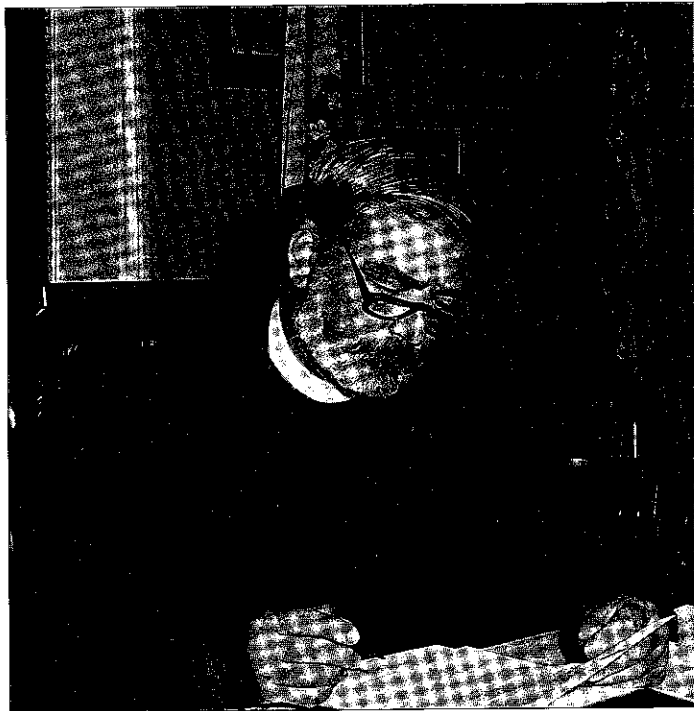

Spring Hill College is the oldest college in Alabama and the third oldest Jesuit institution in the country. Founded in 1830, the college offers a rigorous liberal arts program as well as graduate programs in business, teacher education and theology.

The student body of 1,100 hails from 34 states and 12 foreign countries. The 14.1 student/faculty ratio means that students and professors work

very closely together. Numerous academic support programs, complimented by a strong athletic program, also help students to explore academic, career and personal opportunities. At Spring Hill, education goes beyond the classroom.

The Spring Hill experience is the formation of men and women into persons who are intellectually, spiritually, socially and morally mature.

I am optimistic about the upcoming season and am especially pleased to have an experienced team coming back. The 1987-88 squad has six returning letterman, including four starters.

Our goals are to win 20 games and get into a post-season tournament. If we stay healthy, those goals are entirely within our reach. Last year, we won the most games in the history of the school (21), qualified for the post-season District 30 play-offs in Hattiesburg and lost a heartbreaker, by one point (72-71), to eventual Champion William Carey.

The 1987-88 basketball schedule features an attractive 17 game home slate and three non-conference road trips to Nashville, Miami and the New York-New Jersey area. Regular season opponents include several NCAA teams including Armstrong State, Brigham Young-Hawaii, St. Thomas University and Troy State, as well as NAIA powerhouse Trevecca College (ranked 3rd nationally in pre-season polls) in Nashville, Tenn. Our 16 game Gulf Coast Athletic Conference schedule promises to be extremely difficult because of the overall balance of the league. Overall the strength of this year's schedule should excite our fans; certainly it will challenge our team.

This year the Badgers will again be led by Chris Williams, a 6'5" All-American wing-guard from Memphis, Tennessee, who is certain to become the all-time leading scorer in the history of the college.

Williams will be complemented in the back court by two-time All-Gulf Coast Athletic Conference point guard and Tri-Captain, Chris Nelson. The speedy 5'11" guard has already broken the school mark for assists and last year shot 54.2%. He was voted the teams Most Valuable Player.

Up front, the Badgers rely on 6'6", 216 lb., two-time All-Conference Hi-post player and team Tri-Captain, Darin Tang. Tang, like Williams and Nelson, is a three year starter. He has led the team in rebounding all three years, while shooting over 50% from the floor.

The fourth starting returnee is long-range specialist, 6'5" sophomore, wing-guard Mike McKinley. As a freshman, McKinley led the conference in three-point shooting with a percentage of nearly 50% (48.1).

The fifth starting position will be hotly contested by a pair of 6'7" part-time starters (junior Anthony Harris and senior Jon Thelen), and several talented newcomers from what is considered to be one of the schools best ever recruiting classes.

This squad has been working extremely hard in practice and from what I've seen, we should be a very, very good team.

We have dedicated this basketball season to our seniors, James Brandyburg, Chris Nelson, Darin Tang, Jon Thelen and Chris Williams.

These young men, who came here together as freshmen, have prospered in our basketball program; a program which holds paramount the academic policies of the college as well as the spiritual and personal growth of each student-athlete.

On the court, they have set more than thirty individual and team records while compiling the winningest win-loss record in the history of the college.

Off the court, all five will graduate in **four** years with excellent grades. Several of them have been leaders in ROTC, fraternities, and other student related activities.

Obviously, they all have been more than representative of the total student body in general academic achievement and overall educational experience.

As a result, these five senior basketball players provide living testimony to the fact that sane and sensible athletics can be successful in an intellectually stimulating and educationally sound academic environment.

In fact, **all** that we have accomplished in inter-collegiate athletics here at Spring Hill is simply an affirmation of the college's commitment to athletic excellence in partnership with academic achievement.

While we believe that athletics is truly an important and proper adjunct of the educational enterprise, it is fair to say that there will always be commentary from alarmists who choose to degrade the educational process of intercollegiate athletics and the values it promotes.

Even they, however, cannot deny that significant progress is being made in every area associated with athletics. Graduation rates are improving, drug use and abuse in the majority of programs is declining, cost awareness is under scrutiny and positive lifestyle values are being promoted in role model programs such as ours.

Thomas Edison once said, "No quality is more essential for success than perseverance." We here at Spring Hill are persevering and we will continue to be successful!

Head Women's Basketball Coach

The 1987-1988 Spring Hill College "Lady Badgers" are extremely excited about this upcoming season. The schedule features 28 games which include Millsaps College (NCAA Division III), Jacksonville State University (NCAA Division II), and Southeastern Louisiana College (NCAA Division I) as well as a challenging Gulf Coast Athletic Conference schedule.

The outlook for this season is very promising with the return and improvement of every player from the 86-87 squad. With the addition of some fine freshmen recruits, the Badgers now have the added depth they have missed in the past.

The "Lady Badgers" have 9 returning letterwomen:

—Ashley Gomillion, a 6'0" junior forward, last year's leading scorer, from Fairhope, Alabama, averaged 18.4 ppg and 8.3 rpg.

—Anita Union, a 5'10" senior forward, last year's leading rebounder, from Brewton, Alabama, averaged 16.4 ppg and 13.6 rpg.

—Tammy Ardoin, a 5'8" junior guard and team spark plug from Franklin, Louisiana, who averaged 10.9 ppg and 3.5 rpg.

—Deanne Neyrey, a 5'4" junior multipurpose guard from New Orleans, Louisiana, averaged 9.0 ppg and 3.4 rpg.

—Janice Porter, a 5'10" junior forward, the team's third leading rebounder, from Mobile, Alabama, averaged 7.3 ppg and 7.6 rpg.

—Debora Simmons, a 5'5" junior point guard from Magnolia, Mississippi, averaged 2.2 ppg and 1.3 rpg. Debora is one of the most improved players on the roster.

—Angela Davis, a 6'3" sophomore center from Clinton, Louisiana, who saw limited action last year, but who is making great progress, will be a big asset to this year's team.

—Frances Sanders, a 5'6" sophomore guard from Huntsville, Alabama, has the ability to play three positions on the floor. With her speed and quickness, Frances adds depth to the guard and wing spots.

—Kim Jenkins, a 5'11" junior forward from New Orleans, Louisiana, after a year on inactivity, has the ability to establish herself as a dominate player on the team as well as in league play.

Newcomers to the Lady Badgers

—Lisa Giometti, a 5'9" freshman guard/forward from Georgetown, Tennessee, has the ability to be an immediate factor with her shooting and ball handling skills.

—Christina Taulli, 6'1" freshman forward from New Orleans, Louisiana, will make the inside game of the Badgers even more potent with post skills and rebounding effort.

All in all, it should be an exciting season for the "Lady Badgers".

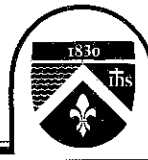

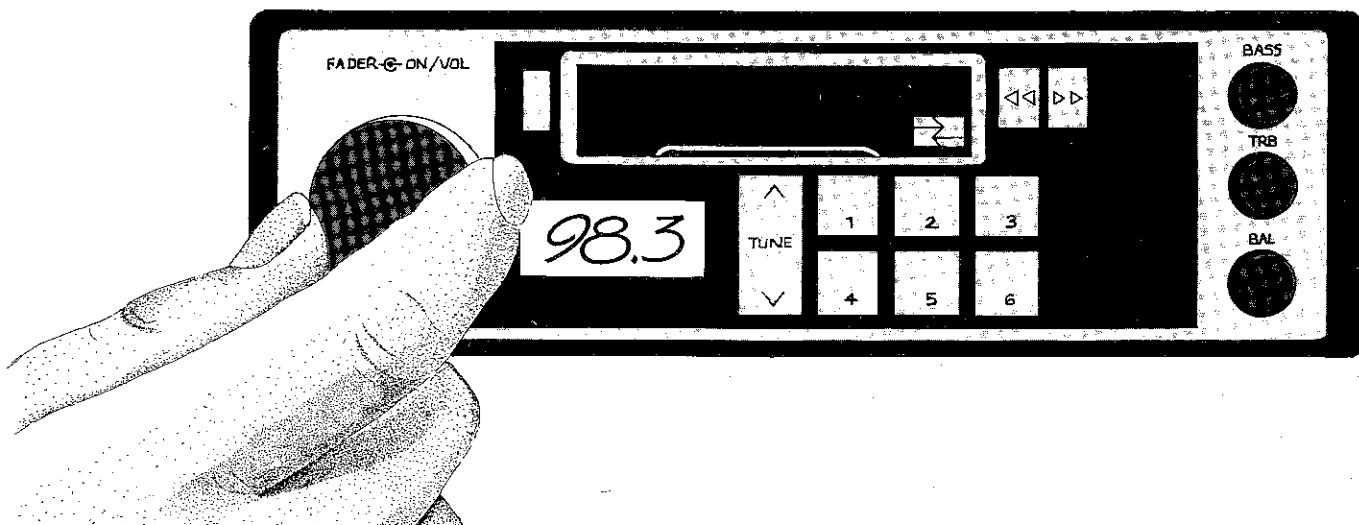
