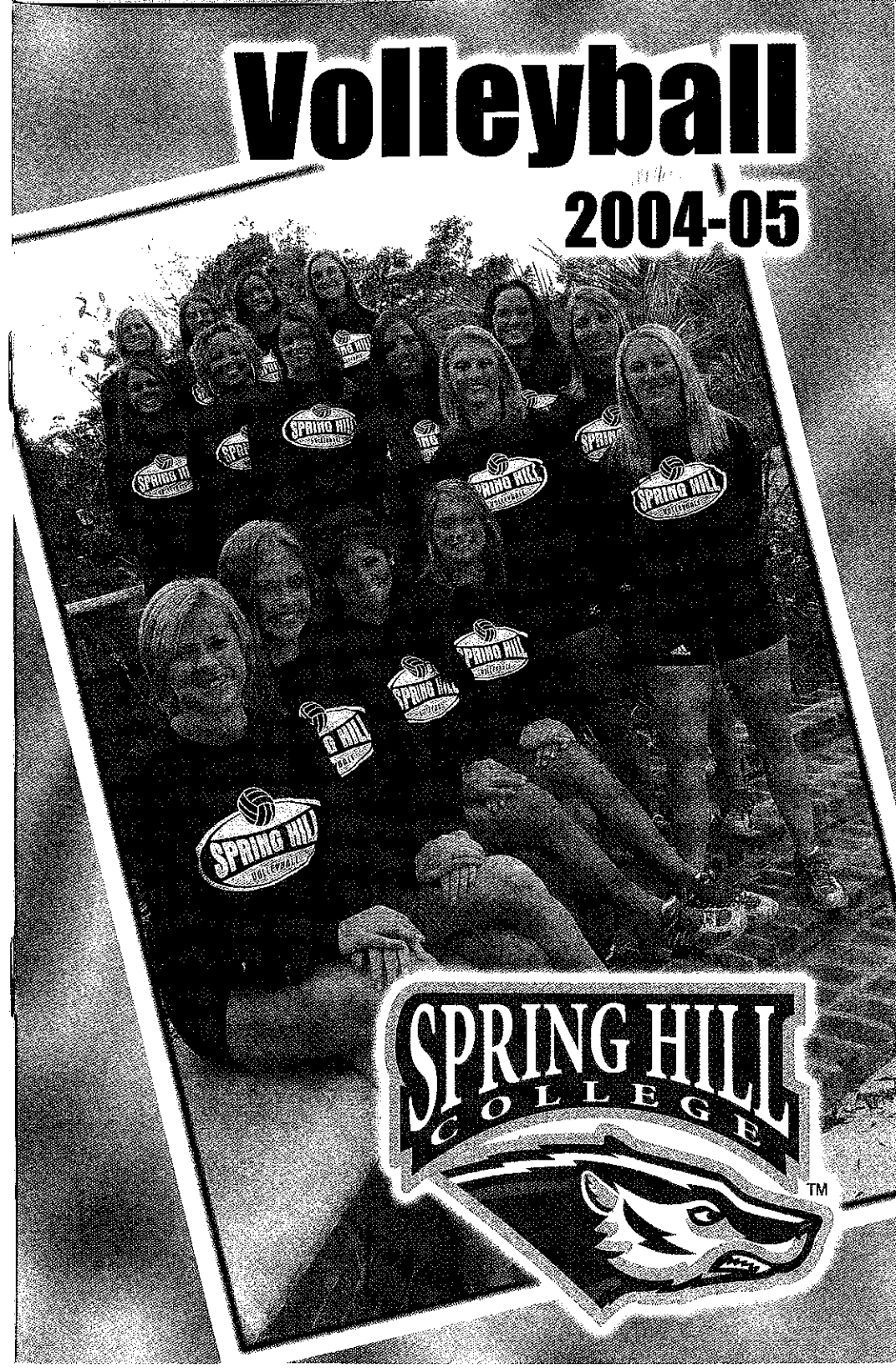

HEAD COACH GRETCHEN SPEED



Gretchen Speed begins her fourth season at the helm of the Badger volleyball team. Coming off the best season in the new era of volleyball at Spring Hill, Speed is looking for bigger and better things from her team this year.

Speed led the Badgers to their first ever NAIA National Tournament last season after winning the Region XII Championship. In three short seasons, Speed has rebuilt a program from the ground all the way to the national stage. The Badgers finished the 2003 season with only one conference loss (7-1), and the most wins in school history (35). The steady rise of the Spring Hill volleyball program is due to Speed's relentless attitude and outstanding ability.

Speed was hired in 2001 with the task of bringing back the sport that had briefly been a part of the athletic program from 1976-1979. After three seasons, she has an overall record of 76-57, which includes an overall conference record of 14-7.

No stranger to Mobile area volleyball, Speed was well established as a player at both the high school and collegiate levels. She prepped at Mobile's McGill-Toolen High School from 1988-1991 and was selected All-County, All-Area, and All-State as a senior. Later, at the University of Montevallo, Speed made her mark as a collegiate standout.

As a setter, she was the first four-time NAIA All-American for the Lady Falcons from 1992-1995 under head coach Judy Green (now the head coach at the University of Alabama). While at Montevallo, Speed set single-season and career records for assists and the career record for games played, while leading Montevallo to four straight NAIA National Tournament appearances.

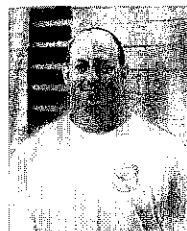
Her mark of 7,245 career assists remains an NAIA record, and Speed also ranks third all-time in NAIA volleyball history with 356 service aces.

Speed excelled both on the court and in the classroom. She was the first Montevallo athlete to be selected NAIA Scholar-Athlete for two consecutive seasons. She was also inducted into Phi Kappa Phi, Omicron Delta Kappa, Kappa Omicron Nu, and Lambda Delta honorary societies, and was selected for Who's Who in American Universities and Colleges. Speed was both an NAIA Southern States Conference and NCAA Division II Gulf South Conference All-Academic selection, and the recipient of the A.O. Duer Award, the NAIA's highest individual award for excellence in athletics, leadership, and academics.

As a senior, Speed was selected NAIA Region Player of the Year, and she won the Fred Sington Award for the top female in the state of Alabama. She was inducted into Montevallo's Athletic Hall of Fame in May 2001.

Her coaching background has centered on the club level. Speed coached the Sojourners Club, based out of Birmingham, while she was at Montevallo. That was followed by the Colorado Springs Volleyball Club in 1997 and the Mobile-based Move Your Feet Volleyball Club from 1998-2000, where she led the team to three straight national tournament appearances. Also, Speed was the JV coach at McGill-Toolen for two years.

Speed began playing volleyball at the University of South Alabama in 1990 and has been involved in the sport of volleyball ever since. He started playing club volleyball in 1997 and his team has been to the national championships five times. His club team won Men's BB Club National Championship in Minnesota in 2003.

Speed is married to Spring Hill head volleyball coach Gretchen Speed and is a native of Mobile, Ala. He is currently in nursing school at the University of South Alabama.

"Jon is a wonderful teacher of the game," Gretchen Speed said. "He has a youthful enthusiasm that he transfers to the girls on the court."

Conor Gee begins his second season as a student-assistant coach for the Badgers volleyball team.

Gee played varsity volleyball for three seasons at Oak Park River Forest High School in Chicago, Ill. He also played for the prominent club team, Circus.

Gee is a sophomore at Spring Hill majoring in Communications.

"Conor has been a great asset to our program," head coach Gretchen Speed said. "He has been a huge help in planning and organizing preseason activities. On the court, Conor is able to run drills allowing me to focus on the players. I believe the best part of having Conor as a part of our team is the energy that he brings. Conor truly cares about the players on the team, and his dedication is greatly appreciated."

2004 SEASON PREVIEW

The 2004 roster of the Spring Hill Badgers might be the best head coach Gretchen Speed has put on the floor. The Badgers are a young team, with only one senior, but only lost one starter from last year's Gulf Coast Athlete Conference and Region XIII Championship team.

"We have a very solid team this season," Speed said. "We are more experienced and mature than we were last season when we made the NAIA National Tournament for the first time. We have worked very hard during the offseason and are poised to make another run at the title."

The 2004 schedule will prepare the Badgers for the tough competition expected in post-season play. The opening tournament pits Spring Hill against preseason #8 Georgetown (Ky.) and preseason #11 Houston Baptist. The schedule also includes Region XIII newcomer and preseason #9 Lee University.

"Our schedule is much more difficult than it was last year. However, playing this type of competition gives us an edge down the road," Speed said.

Setters:

The Badgers return All-Region, All-Conference and GCAC Setter of the Year Carley Whitfield. Whitfield dominated the conference last season averaging 10.32 assists per game. Whitfield also recorded 84 service aces. Spring Hill will also look to freshman Lindsey Schmidt to contribute here.

"Carley is an outstanding setter. She is a leader on the court and runs our offense perfectly. Lindsey Schmidt will have a great opportunity to get playing time and gain some valu-



able experience. She knows how to run a fast offense and will allow us to run two setters on the court at the same time at points."

Outside Hitters:

The Badgers return Lyndsey Manalla, two-time All-Conference and All-Region Ashleigh Posner and two-time All-Conference Kellie King to the outside hitter position this season.

"Lyndsey, Ashleigh and Kellie have really strong arm swings and as long as they continue to improve on what they have accomplished so far in their careers, we will have solid play at that position. Kristen Phillips, an incoming freshman, also has a chance to make a huge impact this season. She has a big swing and I can really see her being a contributor for us," Speed said.

Middle Blockers:

The Badgers return All-Conference Betsy Housh to the middle this season.

"Betsy had a breakout season last year and has only gotten better over the summer. She is a very strong hitter and keeps getting better seeing the block. Ali Mullin has improved a lot during the offseason. Lindsey Howell, a transfer, is a very nice addition to our team and is a great leaper. She is continuing to work on her swing and her block," Speed said.

Back Row:

The Badgers are very strong on defense with juniors Kelly Hargett and Mallory Duren manning the back lines.

"Kelly and Mallory are both outstanding defensive players and passers," Speed said.

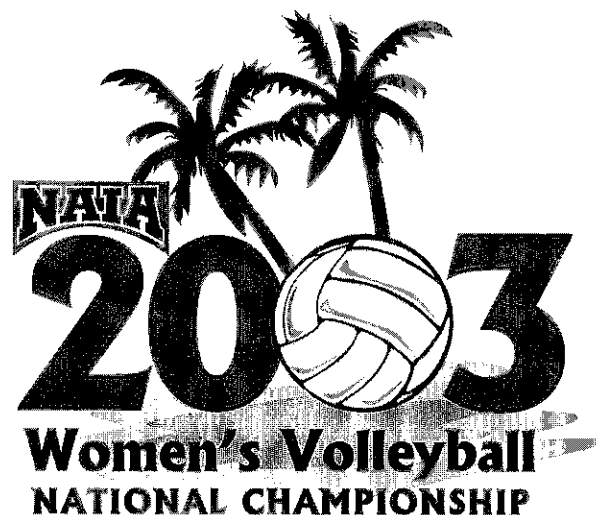

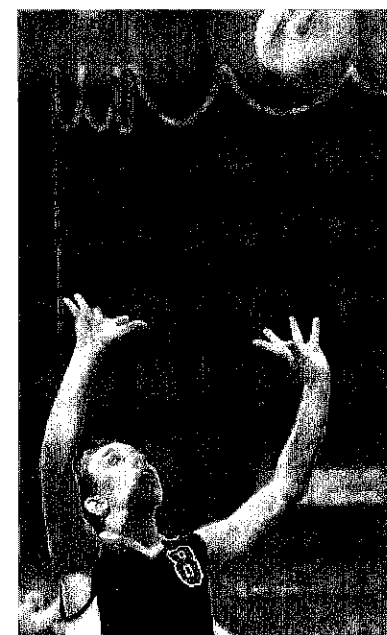

The GCAC first made its appearance in 1981, with Belhaven, College of Jackson, Dillard, Xavier, Louisiana College, Spring Hill, Tougaloo, and William Carey as charter members. Since then, College of Jackson and Louisiana College have left, while Talladega College has come and gone. Also, Mobile joined in 1985, SUNO in 1995, and LSU-Shreveport in 2000. The GCAC then and now brought together schools with similar standards -- private four-year schools, in the Gulf Coast region, who play in the NAIA.

The GCAC holds conference championships in the sports of women's soccer, men's and women's cross-country, volleyball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's tennis, and men's golf.

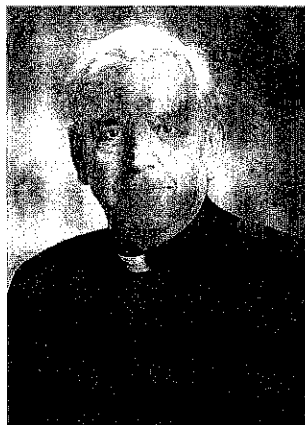
In 2002-2003, Spring Hill College brought home a conference championship in men's tennis, and runner-up trophies in volleyball, women's tennis, and men's golf.

Throughout its history, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) has provided strong leadership for all aspects of intercollegiate sports. Since its introduction of intercollegiate championship basketball in 1937, the NAIA has maintained the highest standards while administering first-rate athletics programs.

The NAIA awards student-athletes with awards for academic achievements, awarding juniors and seniors with a 3.5GPA or higher. They give All-American awards for those athletes who excel in competition. The NAIA also recognizes student-athletes, coaches, and schools through the Champions of Character program. The goal of the Champions of Character program is to promote the true spirit of competition through five tenets: respect, integrity, responsibility, servant leadership, and sportsmanship.

There are currently more than 300 schools and more than 47,000 student-athletes competing in one of 13 NAIA regions and 30 NAIA sport conferences. Hundreds of NAIA students are recognized annually as All-American Scholar-Athletes, and thousands more are honored on the conference level. There are 23 NAIA national championships held every year in 13 sports, as well as championships held at the regional, sectional, and conference levels.

Rev. Gregory F. Lucey, S.J. became Spring Hill College's 37th President on June 1, 1997, and from the beginning his leadership has made a significant impact on the College. With a Vision for the College on the Hill, Fr. Lucey has set into motion plans that have led to record enrollment, development and implementation of a comprehensive Campus Master Plan, and construction of the new Mamie and John Burke Memorial Library that is not only benefitting the Spring Hill community, but all of Mobile. In addition, Fr. Lucey is strengthening the college to be attractive for students and effective in achieving its mission by developing state-of-the-art learning spaces such as those in the newly renovated Quintan Hall. He is enhancing faculty development and providing better living spaces and he oversaw the restoration of St. Joseph Chapel.

Fr. Lucey often remarks that for alumni returning to Spring Hill, the campus experience takes on a new meaning as they see the transformation taking place. Under his guidance, the campus has seen the completion of a new 150-bed residence hall as well as parking and circulation changes designed to make the campus safer and more pedestrian friendly. The College also celebrated its first-ever night baseball games in Spring 2003 as lights were added to Galle Field.

Under Fr. Lucey's direction, Spring Hill College has enjoyed record fund-raising years, including record gifts totaling \$13.5 million from

alumnus and trustee Skip Viragh '68 (1941-2003). Fr. Lucey's goal is to enrich the Spring Hill Experience for every student while making the 174-year old institution a premier, small, residential, Catholic liberal arts college in the Jesuit tradition.

Prior to Spring Hill, Fr. Lucey served as President and Chairman of the Board of the National Jesuit Conference based in Washington, D.C. Additionally, Fr. Lucey served as rector for the Jesuit Community at Marquette University and Vice President for Development at Seattle University. He received a Ph.D. in educational administration from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, an M.A. in liturgy from the University of Notre Dame, as well as undergraduate and graduate degrees in philosophy from St. Louis University.

A Wisconsin native, Fr. Lucey entered the Society of Jesus in 1951 and was ordained in 1964. He founded and served as director of Marquette's Center for Ignatian Spirituality and in 1995 he attended the 34th General Congregation of the Society of Jesus as one of 200 delegates worldwide. He is a trustee of Loyola University, New Orleans and Marquette University.

Doug Mosley begins his first full season as Director of Athletics and Recreation for Spring Hill College. Mosley, who began his duties in December 2003, oversees all the day-to-day operations of the College's Department of Athletics and Recreation.

Mosley came to Spring Hill after serving as the Assistant Director of Athletic Development at Troy University. While at Troy, Mosley helped launch the Red Wave executive suites program at Movie Gallery Veterans Stadium and managed 27 suites for university boosters and fans. Prior to that, Mosley served as marketing and public relations manager for Comcast Sports Southeast (CSS) where he helped grow the company to become the nation's seventh-largest regional sports network.

As Director of Sports Information, Broadcasting and Technology for the NAIA from 1996 to 2000, Mosley planned and directed event publicity for 23 national championships annually, served as an association spokesperson, produced and syndicated NAIA events for national broadcast and launched the NAIA website. Mosley also has extensive experience at the international sports level, serving as the softball venue press chief during the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, a representative for Kodak's photographer services at the 1998 Goodwill Games in New York and a USOC track and field press attache during the 1999 Pan Am Games in Winnipeg. He has also been active

in the USOC's Olympic Public Relations Association (OPRA).

Mosley has more than 14 years of sports media and marketing experience and is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). He was formerly a member of the board of directors for both the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the NAIA Sports Information Directors Association (NAIA-SIDA). He's been a sports writer for the Pensacola News-Journal and the Leaf Chronicle (Clarksville, Tenn.) and was sports information director for Auburn University-Montgomery from 1994-96.

Mosley earned his bachelor's in business administration and marketing from Culver-Stockton College in Canton, Mo., where he played varsity football and tennis. He's married to Stacy and has one son, Luke (2).

About 80% of our students – and 91% of our freshmen – live on campus in one of seven residence halls. Each room has Internet access, comes with a full cable package, and is air-conditioned, of course!

But the most important part of the room, the floor, and the hall is the way students there nurture the friendships that influence you for the rest of your life. When you live together, you can take advantage of those spur-of-the-moment opportunities that turn out to be a blast. GROW YOUR SPIRIT

In the spirit of St. Ignatius, who founded the Jesuit order in 1540, Campus Ministry programs involve each element – mind, body and spirit. When Spring Hill students do a street feed, for example, first they study the problem, examining statistics and discussing issues to see where the injustice lies. Then they go do the work, physically engaging with the homeless. Finally comes the reflection, prayer and spiritual growth. Other projects include Christmas on the Hill, Spring Break Immersion Trips, Urban Immersion weekends, and Habitat for Humanity.

Liturgies twice daily give the opportunity for the Spring Hill community to join in prayer. The school year opens with a Mass of the Holy Spirit each fall, and an Ecumenical Prayer Service is held at the beginning of each spring semester.

We offer four-year guaranteed housing in our residence halls and apartments, so you won't find yourself scrambling for off-campus accommodations. The suite-based Fairway Apartments, opened in 1996, offer convenience combined with sweeping golf course views. No surprise that it's the first choice of many juniors and seniors.

Viragh Hall, a three-story student residence completed in 2002, houses about 146 students in non-traditional suite-style living. Each six-to-eight-person suite consists of two-person bedrooms, a shared living room, two bathrooms and an outdoor patio. A kitchen area, computer room and lounge provide space for socializing.

A new student residence, set to open for the 2005 fall semester will accommodate 222 people in single and double rooms connected by a bath between each pair. The U-shaped complex features an interior courtyard, two 40-seat classrooms, study rooms and bright, airy public gathering spaces.

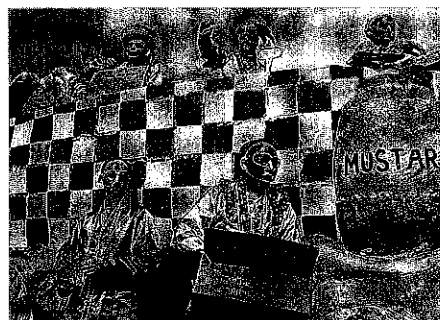
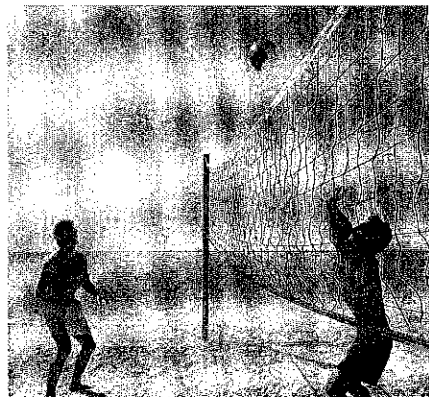

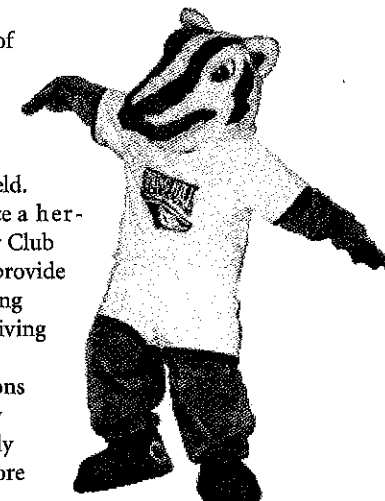
